THE BUFFALO TRAGEDY.

President McKinley lived just one week after the assassin's bullet entered his body, a week of hope mingled with fear, a period of intense strain, now indicating recovery of the distinguished patient, then uncertainty, and last the fall of the terrible blow—death.

The tragedy at Buffalo has sent the whole civilized world into mourning, but especially bitter is the grief of seventy-five millions of people who respected and honored their Chief Magistrate. It is not too much to say that McKinley was the idol of the American nation, regardless of political affiliations. He was a man strong in characteristics that the world admires—courage, pluck, affability, great strength of character, a statesman, and a Christian gentleman. He ruled in troublous times, but never faltered from the path of duty. Long before he arrived at the presidency he was a great figure in national affairs, the Republican leader in Congress and in the country. The war with Spain and the development of imperialism, the addition of a colonial Empire gave rise to weighty problems which McKinley met and handled with decision and success, but just when his greatest difficulties seemed to be settled, when everything was apparently calm on the surface of national politics, when he might naturally look forward to a peaceful and pleasant term at the White House, with his people endeared to him, and his policy applauded by even political opponents, the bullet of the dastardly assassin sped on its murderous errand, and after a week of suffering heroically borne, the brave McKinley is no more—struck down by the hand of a hated anarchist, cut off in the prime of his great manhood and usefulness, a victim to the worst passions of an ignorant, infuriated and relentless conspiracy, which originating in the old world, has firmly planted itself in the new.

Lincoln, Garfield, McKinley, three martyred presidents in thirty-six years. The United States is paying dearly for its boasted liberty, a liberty degenerating into license in the hands of the scum of Europe, which finds a lodgment in the great republic, and which boasts of having shed the blood of kings and queens and presidents.

McKinley's record, both in private and public life, is an honor to his country, and a credit to himself. As a lawyer, a soldier, a statesman and a ruler he has left his mark on the institutions of the republic, and his memory will be carefully embalmed as that of one of the nation's greatest presidents.

The sympathy of all Canadians will be extended in no mean or stinted measure to the people of the United States in their overwhelming sorrow, and especially to our tenderest condolences due to the lady of the White House, whose delicate condition of health may scarce be able to withstand the shock of the Buffalo tragedy.

May God grant to Mrs McKinley and the American people, patience, submission and courage, in this the hour of their great trial, in this the time of their overshadowing peril.

CLOSING IN FOR A STRUGGLE.

The city council has resolved to grapple as a body with the rebellious city clerk, and have called a special meeting for Monday evening to deal with his case. It is said that the clerk is resolved to die game, and may resist even the council's

formal order to evacuate his back office. In that case it may be necessary to call out the military, or at least to send for the junior alderman for Carleton ward, at present arrayed in his fighting togs at camp Sussex. We have read of evictions in Ireland, but now there is a possibility of a real one being enacted before our very eyes. The situation is both funny and ludicrous.

Theodor Roosevelt is forced into a position of great prominence by the death of President McKinley. The daring organizer of the "Rough Riders" is the chief magistrate of the nation. No man in the history of the United States has had such a rapid rise, and Americans have great confidence in his ability and judgment. He made a model governor of New York, and may be expected to fully rise to his present great responsibilities.

When Queen Victoria died and the whole British Empire was plunged in grief, President McKinley's words of condolence to the British people were hearty and sincere, but little was it thought that the citizens of the United States would so soon be plunged into mourning by the death of their ruler. The two great nations can clasp hands in their mutual sorrow.

The Nova Scotia Liberals have already nominated candidates in every county except Kings and Guysboro, while in nine of the eighteen counties the Conservatives have not a man in the field. The Halifax Chronicle claims that at least five counties will go to the government by acclamation.

Canada has a sacred duty to guard the heir apparent, our guest, against the bullets of anarchists who may be seeking his life. He must be surrounded by every possible safeguard from the moment he lands at Quebec until he leaves Halifax for home.

"Good-bye all: Good-bye: It is God's way; his will be done," were President McKinley's last words. The brave man died as he lived, with a full belief in God and trust in His infinite mercy.

The United States authorities should make short and sharp work of the President's assassin, and all the infamous anarchist cattle in league with the murderer.
