

EMMERSON NAMED

In Connection with the Supreme Court Vacancy.

BUT IS MORE LIKELY TO BE MINISTER OF MARINE AND FISHERIES.

Successor to late Judge King.

Must Be a Maritime Province Man.

(Special to Daily Herald)

Ottawa, May 8.—The Supreme Court is in session today despite the lamented death of Judge King.

The vacancy will be filled at once. Hon David Mills is again mentioned, but the dead jurist's successor must be a maritime province man. The Court is composed of two judges from Ontario, two from Quebec and two from the maritime provinces.

Sir Louis Davies is named in some quarters, but Hon H R Emmerson, M P, finds many admirers.

Davies has said that he did not want it but should be elevated to the bench Mr Emmerson would no doubt enter the cabinet as Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

Judge Gregory of Fredericton is also mentioned in connection with the vacancy on the bench.

LIBERALS HAVE MAJORITY.

Quebec May 8.—The death of Hon. J J Ross, who was a member of the Senate and also of the Legislature Council of Quebec, will transform the political complexion of the latter Chamber from Conservative to Liberal.

The Legislative Council has been equally divided on political lines—twelve Conservatives and twelve Liberals. It will hereafter contain thirteen Liberals and eleven Conservatives. This will be the first time the Liberals have been in a majority in the Council since the Mercier Administration.

MURDERED INFANTS WHOLESALE.
