AGAIN TURNED DOWN.

Editor Simonds' Claim Once More Overlooked by the Council.

Although the city council transacted a large amount of business at last night's meeting, there was one matter down on the programme which seems to have been entirely overlooked. It was in regard

to the appointment of an assistant to City Clerk Beckwith. Ald. McNally had prepared a resolution on the subject, but he failed to get it before the council, much to the disappointment of our esteemed friend Editor Simonds. It is only fair to the junior alderman for Carleton ward, however, to say that he made several attempts to have his resolution considered, but was declared to be out of order on each occasion. The alderman was called away later in the evening, and when the time came when his resolution would have been in order he was not there to move it. Ald. Everett, who had promised to second Ald. McNally's motion, endeavored by a lengthy discourse on the cow question to keep the council in session until the other should return, but the plan failed to work. Ald. McNally arrived just as the other aldermen were filing out of the chamber, and lost no time in consigning the resolution which he had left lying on his desk, to the waste basket. The religious editor and his brother were interested spectators of the proceedings, and the former was much chagrined over the cold blooded manner in which his interests were sacrificed. It is said that he contemplates bringing an action against Alds McNally and Everett for breach of promise.

The Jury Disagreed.

At Centerville, Carleton Co., last week before G. E. McClintock, J. P., Dr. F. M. Brown, formerly of Fredericton, brought suit to compel Rainsford Trafford to pay \$43 for professional services in setting a broken bone in his leg. To this the defendant demurred, and put in an offset for malpractice, leaving his leg crooked, which will cause him to be crippled for life. F. B. Carvell and W. P. Jones were the attorneys, the former in the doctor's and the latter in defendant's interest. The jury after hearing evidence for both parties failed to agree on a verdict, and was discharged. The nature of the case and reputation of the doctor attracted a large gathering at the court.

A Strange Find.

Yesterday afternoon while John Kirk, an employe of William Elgar, the Smyth street milk dealer, and several companions, were probing into some old rubbish on a lane leading from Brick Hill road through the Odell property they came across a quantity of canned salmon. There were about forty cans in the lot and it had evidently been there since early in the spring. Some of the cans were opened, and the contents was found to be in good condition. It is generally supposed that the goods were taken from some of our grocery stores by thieves and hidden away until a favorable opportunity should come for disposing of them.

Ald. Roseborough Injured

Ald. William Roseborough met with quite a serious accident this forenoon, and as a result will probably be confined to his home for several days. He had been at work upon a chimney at the residence of I. R. Golding, York street, and while in the act of descending a ladder carrying his tools, one of the rungs gave way, precipitating him to the ground a distance of about six feet. He landed quite heavily upon a deal beneath the ladder and received a very bad shaking up though fortunately no bones were broken. He had to be removed to his home in a coach.
