

WOODSTOCK NEWS.

(Special Correspondence to the Herald.)

July 29.—The Pan-American circus which visited town last Monday, drew an immense crowd of people, and the fakirs must have taken away a barrel of money. One of their employees entered a house near the park and stole a watch and twenty dollars. The young lady to whom the property belonged laid the matter before the deputy sheriff, who informed the circus manager that the combination could not leave town until the thief was handed over. After a couple of hours this was done and the property secured all but a few dollars. The thief was tried before the police magistrate and sentenced to four years in penitentiary. The circus was considered a fake all through.

On Tuesday morning the body of an unknown man was picked up on the railroad at a point about 14 miles below Woodstock. He was discovered by the Vanceboro freight, and was quite cold when discovered. The head and shoulders were completely severed from the rest of the body. The remains were packed up and brought to town, and laid out at Jacob Vanwart's, undertaker. Large crowds viewed the remains, but none seemed to know them. Nothing found on the body gave the slightest clue as to his identity. He was about 30 years of age, 5 feet, 8 inches high, and would weigh about 160 pounds. His remains were interred in the Woodstock cemetery, presumably at the expense of the C.P.R. He was a dark complexioned fellow, and one of the doctors say has the marks of Blondin, the wanted wife murderer. It is generally thought that the man was stealing a ride, and losing his balance fell across the rails, and was instantly killed.
