NOTES OF THE NEWS.

Interesting Occurrences
Paraphrased for Her-
ald Readers.

FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

Miss Flora Snider, a young lady living near Harrowsmith, Ont., lost her life in a peculiar manner Saturday. While she was helping her brother to saw wood the rapidly revolving circular saw broke into pieces, cutting Miss Snider so badly she died in a few minutes.

The St. John schooner Clayola, 123 tons, towed up to Nelson on Monday, July 22 took 1,190,000 laths on board at Lynch's mill in less than two and a half days, with nobody at the work except the stevedore and three sailors belonging to the vessel, and towed down to Chatham on Thursday ready for sea.

Pana, Ill., July 27.—John Russell, a farmer living near Tower Hill, mysteriously disappeared 33 years ago and until today no trace of him ever has been found. The skeleton of a man found beneath the floor of a house which was torn down today has been identified as that of the man who vanished a generation ago. Trinkets found with the body made identification possible.

Charles Anderson, colored, was publicly hanged at Little Rock, Ark. Saturday for a criminal assault on a white woman one year ago. When the black cap was being placed over the dead man's head scores of negro women became frenzied with excitement, and rent the air with their screams as they rolled upon the lawn of the State House yard adjacent to the place of execution.

The city of Hull, Quebec, is in a much better position now than it was before the great fire fifteen months ago. The assessment roll place the taxable property in the transpontine city at \$3,165,000. A year ago, before the building operations following the fire were far advanced, the estimate was \$1,700,000. Before that date the taxable property was valued at \$2,500,000, so that the city is \$655,000 ahead as a result of the fire. The difference is accounted for by the better class of buildings erected. The non-taxable property, churches, schools, etc., is valued at about \$1,000,000. The population of the city according to the assessment roll is 13,994.

George F. Seaver, superintendent of Buffalo Electrical Exhibits at the Pan-American, is making arrangements to signal to Toronto with the big searchlight on the electric tower. The signal will be answered from a natural elevation back of Toronto, 300 feet above the level of the lake. Mr. Seaver is confident that the experiments will be a success and that even at the great distance it will be possible to read the messages. Thursday night, from the top of the tower, Mr. Seaver, in the presence of the electrical jury, carried on a searchlight conversation with Niagara Falls, for the purpose of demonstrating to the members of the jury the feasibility of sending messages with searchlights.

The Militia Department, Ottawa, is now in the midst of preparations for the reviews and guards of honor demanded by the approaching Royal visit. A list of the regiments that are to take part in the big Toronto review and the lesser parades at Quebec and Halifax has been drawn up and is now before the Government for approval. There is a likelihood that it may be made known later. It is learned that companies of the Royal Regt. of Canadian Infantry will be brought to Ottawa from Toronto, London and other places, in order to take part with the local militia in furnishing guards of honor and guards at Government House. The permanent corps will furnish the guards for night and day duty at Rideau Hall while their Royal Highnesses remain in Ottawa.

One of the most ludicrous mistakes made by the telegraph was caused by the loss of a single dot in a telegram from Brisbane to a London news agency. As it reached London it read: "Governor-General twins first son," which the news agency "edited" and sent around to the papers in the following form: "Lady Kennedy, the wife of Sir Arthur Kennedy, Governor-General of Queensland, yesterday gave birth at Government House,

Brisbane, to twins, the first born being a son." The telegram was published by most of the newspapers in London and the Provinces, and caused an unexpected sensation. Sir Arthur's friends pointed out with conclusive force that some one had blundered, as there never was a Lady Kennedy, Sir Arthur being a bachelor. The repeat message, which followed, read: "Governor-General turns first son," referring to a railway company.

WIFE BEATER PUNISHED.

Chicago Man Given a Coat of Tar and Feathers.

Chicago, July 29.—Valentine Miller, a habitual wife beater, received a coat of tar and feathers last night at the hands of indignant citizens of West Chicago. A score of women took part in the proceedings and saw that the work was thoroughly done.

There were more than 50 persons in the tar and feather party, and among them were several of the most prominent residents of the city. No masks were worn nor was any attempt made to conceal identities. Constable Thomas Mulcahy was present, but made no effort to check the proceedings further than to insist that no serious violence be done.

Miller, who is a German, is an old offender. He has been arrested time and again for abusing his wife, and has been sent to jail several times, only to repeat his ill-treatment of her as soon as he was free.

Yesterday afternoon he was paid for work he had completed, and hastened to a saloon to spend his money. When he returned home he brutally assaulted his wife. A little girl who was passing the house heard the woman's screams and informed the neighbors. Several persons went to her assistance, but when they arrived Miller had fled. His wife was found upon the floor bleeding from cuts in the face.

"Catch the brute, tie him to a post and turn the hose on him!" shouted some one. "Give him tar and feathers!" cried several of the women. Some of the women ran to their houses to get pillow cases, which were ripped open for the feathers, and others hastened for warm buckets of tar.

After a search of two hours Miller was caught. His clothes were torn from his body to the waist, and buckets of tar poured over him. Pillows were brought and their contents shaken over him. A

rope was tied around the fellow's neck and the other end went over the limb of an apple tree.

When his captors began pulling on the line Miller begged for mercy so piteously that he was finally released with a warning.
