THE VICE REGAL RECEPTION.

All the conditions, the weather included, were favorable to the reception of His Excellency the Governor General and Countess Minto, and Their Excellencies must have been greatly pleased with the hearty manner in which their first visit to Fredericton was hailed by the people. The crowd at the depot, the congested condition of the principal streets and sidewalks through which the distinguished visitors passed, the cheers that greeted their progress, the decorations, the hospitality displayed, all must have convinced Their Excellencies that they were welcome to the capital of New Brunswick.

The great regret on the part of the citizens at least was that the visitors could not remain longer with us, that they could not find time to visit the prosperous town of Marysville, and see something of our beautiful rural scenery as exhibited in a trip on the boat down river.

The civic address to His Excellency was none too long, and very neatly expressed the sentiment of our people towards the representative of royalty in Canada and his worthy consort, and His Excellency's reply was uttered with eloquence and evident sincerity.

The reception and entertainment of Their Excellencies throughout were marked by good taste, enthusiasm and success, and the gentlemen who had the arrangements in hand deserve credit for what they accomplished.

We trust that Their Excellencies, having had a glimpse of the beauties and hospitality of Fredericton, may pay this city another and longer visit before the term of their official residence expires.

UNPRECEDENTED HARVEST.

Mr. McNicholl, vice-president of the C. P. R., who has been cruising through Manitoba, says that the crops of the prairie province promise an unparalleled yield. There is no complaint anywhere he declares, and he found the farmers and business men everywhere in great spirits. One thing troubling them is the probable scarcity of harvest hands.

The Canadian Pacific Railway Company, the Manitoba Government and the Government at Ottawa are doing all in their power to procure harvesters, but wages in the east are very high, and it may not be easy to get as many as are required. Another thing the farmers and grain buyers are anxious about is whether the C. P. R. shall be able to move the immense crop to Lake Superior before navigation closes. Mr. McNicholl says on this point that his company are making very large additions to the rolling stock and motive power, and will be in a position to take care of the traffic, provided they are given a fair chance.

It is admitted, says Mr. Ford in his cable letter, that the new title of King Edward, which he chose himself, is an admirable one. It avoids the words colonies or dependencies, which, in view of the rapidly growing importance of the self-governing colonial States, might soon cease to appear adequate, and at the same time, it gives the title of King general application. There is reason to believe, Mr. Ford adds, that no other title but that of King would have met the views of the colonial governments.

The Montreal Herald in a lengthy article recalling the present King's visit to Montreal in 1860, says that H. R. H. at the grand ball in his honor, danced every dance but one of the twenty-one on the programme.

A couple of aldermen who are said to have had some personal grievance regarding the arrangements for the vice regal reception, took no part in the formal welcome of Their Excellencies to the city. It is not known exactly what grave offence to Their Eminent Highnesses, but it is a fact that they were not in the procession but viewed it from a friendly doorstep and was not present at the afternoon proceedings. The people of Kings and Carleton wards have a right to some explanation from their junior representatives in the council.

The Missisquoi protested election case, in which it was sought to unseat Mr. D. B. Meigs, the Liberal member for the House of Commons, has fallen through. The petitioner did not press his motion for a date to be set for the trial, the time for such action expired on the 17th, consequently Mr. Meigs will retain the seat. Hon. H. R. Emmerson is in the same position. No application was made within the proper time to set down the petition against him for hearing, and it is now out of court.

Some weeks ago Mr. Findlay, an Australian M. P., was expelled from his seat for publishing in his newspaper a Dublin newspaper's attack on King Edward. Mr. Findlay was a candidate for the seat in a new election contest, but the ministerialists and opposition combined to defeat him and did it handsomely, the loyalist candidate securing a vote of nearly two to Mr. Findlay's one. So may perish politically all disloyalists.

We loan the Governor General and Lady Minto to Fredericton today. Let the celestial city be grateful accordingly. —Telegraph. [Really, how wonderfully considerate. It is said His Excellency is so pleased with his reception here that he is sorry St. John had not loaned him to Fredericton for another day, so that he would not have his pleasant impressions removed by returning to St. John this evening.]

Somebody has started a story that Mr. Chamberlain is insisting that Sir Chas. Tupper shall be the next Governor General of Canada. Twenty years ago such report might have found credence, but Sir Chas. is too old now for the position. But if he were in charge of the government house at Ottawa, wouldn't he make it hot for the Grits?

La Touch Tupper who has arrived at St. John on his trip to the maritime provinces to engage men for harvesting the enormous wheat yield of Manitoba and the Northwest, says at least 40,000 will be required. Wages run from \$30 to \$55 per month.

It is said that that tried and true old Liberal, James McMullen, ex-M. P. for North Wellington, Ont., is to succeed the late Hon. G. W. Allen in the Senate. Liberals all over Canada would be pleased to hear of Mr. McMullen's appointment.

When a Kiss Was Valuable.

The practice of kissing the hands was instituted by the early Roman rulers as a mark of subjection as much as one of respect, and under the first Caesars the custom was kept up, but only for a time. These worthies conceived the idea that the proper homage due to their exalted station called for less familiar modes of obeisance, so the privilege of kissing the emperor's hand was reserved as a special mark of condescension or distinction for officers of high rank.

Roman fathers considered the practice of kissing of so delicate a nature that they never kissed their wives in the presence of their daughters. Then, too, only the nearest relatives were allowed to kiss their kindred of the gentler sex on the mouth, for in those days, as now, kissing was not a mere arbitrary sign, but it was the spontaneous language of the affections, especially that of love.

Under the Romans if a lover kissed his betrothed before marriage she inherited half of his worldly goods in the event of his death before the marriage ceremony, and if she died her heritage descended to her nearest relatives.—Frank H. Vizetelly in Woman's Home Companion.
