Excursion Cancelled

The excursion to Fredericton planned for today by the Free Baptists of Woodstock, was cancelled last evening by order of the Provincial Board of Health. Fears were entertained that the excursion if allowed to take place might be the means of spreading the smallpox, which has broken out near Woodstock.

Death at Lake George.

Mrs. Olive C. Burden, widow of the late David Burden, died at her home at Lake George on Wednesday, after an illness brought on by the infirmities of age. She was 80 years of age and leaves a family of four sons and four daughters. The funeral will take place tomorrow, Rev. Mr. Sables officiating. John G. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

SMALLPOX OUTBREAK.

Four Cases Said to Exist Near Woodstock.

Woodstock, N. B., July 29.—Information has been received this evening that smallpox has broken out about seven miles from Woodstock, at Red Bridge. Four cases are already reported. John McBride, aged about 42 years, is afflicted. Mrs. Judson Briggs and her daughter have been afflicted with the dread disease, but both are somewhat better this evening. Her son is down with the disease now.

Clergymen have visited the house and other neighbors, not knowing the disease was smallpox, and it is feared the disease will spread.

Dr. Hand is in attendance this evening. A visitor from Montana is supposed to have brought the malady here.

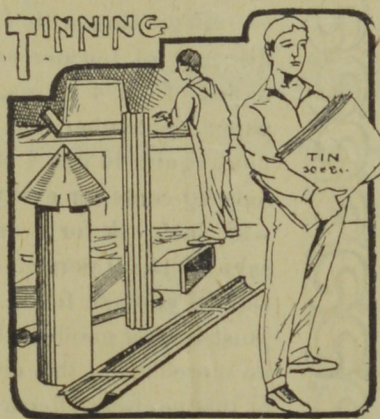
