

WARMLY WELCOMED

The interior of the parliament building was most attractively decorated, with flags, bunting, potted plants etc. In the centre of the main corridor was grouped in circular form a large number of potted plants of many varieties, capped by a beautiful Abyssinian banana tree. Flags and bunting covered the doorway, on either side, making a very pretty effect.

The interior of the assembly chamber, where the reception took place presented an attractive and cheerful appearance. The members desks had all been removed, and in the centre of the floor a huge mound of potted plants, capped by a sea-forthia elegant palm loomed up most conspicuously. The gallery railing and walls were covered with bunting, and beautiful cut flowers and potted plants were everywhere in evidence.

In the spacious library, where refreshments were served, the decorations were very much admired. The walls were covered with light material of red, white and blue, and miniature flags tastily arranged were to be seen on all sides. The material for the library decorations was supplied by Tennant, Davies & Clarke, and Miss Ada Schleyer supplied the flowers and potted plants. N A Edgecombe superintended the decorating of the assembly chamber and corridor and the potted plants used were from Babington's conservatory.

Their Excellencies left for St. John by special train at five o'clock.

The Decorations.

Among the merchants, who went to considerable trouble in decorating were, Fred B Edgecombe, Tennant Davis & Clarke, George Y Dibblee, John J Weddall, Dever Bros, M L Savage, M Fickler & Co, A A Belmore, Jas H Hawthorn, Miss S C Kelly, and Owen Sharkey. The fronts of the Royal Bank, City Hall, and County Jail presented a very tasty appearance.

During the progress of the reception Winters' orchestra rendered a choice program of music from a position in the assembly chamber, and the 71st band played on the grand stand in front of the parliament building.

The civic address was beautifully engrossed on parchment and bound in Morocco leather. On the title page were the words: "Presented by the citizens of Fredericton, N.B., to His Excellency the Governor General of Canada, July 30th, 1901."

City Marshal Roberts, mounted on a spirited chestnut charger, led the procession of carriages about the streets.

On their way to the depot the vice regal party visited Victoria hospital.

The guard of honor headed by the 71st band turned out again on the departure of Their Excellencies and were drawn up at the depot as on the arrival of the vice-regal party.

Satisfactory Exhibit.

Hon L J Tweedie and Hon William Pugsley visited the oil well at Memramcook on Saturday and were well pleased with what they saw. They found that the well is yielding from 8 to 12 barrels a day. The government obtain a 5 per cent royalty on all the oil raised and the company, under its charter, has to expend \$20,000 per annum. The average yield of the working oil wells of Pennsylvania and Canada is one half barrel a day. The N B Petroleum Company has one of the new pumps in position and soon expects to have all the machinery in working order. The visitors on Saturday were entertained at the college by Revs. Father Roy, Tessier and O'Neil.

The Water too Low.

Part of the crew of D D Glasier's tug-boat Lilly Glasier, were yesterday paid off and the boat has stopped work for a time. It is expected that the water will rise shortly and the boat will again begin work.—Star.
