Final Draft of the Station Sheet Adopted.

OFFICERS ELECTED FOR THE SEVERAL DISTRICTS.

Rev. Jacob Heaney Ordained to the Ministry

CONFERENCE LIKELY TO BE CONCLUDED THIS EVENING.

Monday afternoon's session of the Methodist Conference, was occupied largely with the hearing of reports of conference standing committee.

W D Baskin reported for the Epworth League committee to the effect that in some churches the Epworth Leagues were not in action now, while in other districts there is a gratifying increase of four new leagues with a membership of 77. The committee called attention to the excellent league paper called Epworth Era, which is not as generally used as its merits would justify. Also the Epworth reading course would in the opinion of the committee deserve a larger patronage than it receives. Each year it is made up of some three or four young people's text books on important subjects of interest to young people.

Rev. R. W. Weddall B. A. pastor of Queens Square church, St. John presented a report on the state of the work in which the following recommendation were set forth:

1. The past two years have witnessed a very remarkable financial revival within our church and evidences are not wanting that this is already being followed by increase of spirituality and a further consecration to the work of God. Our people with great enthusiasm have been bringing in their tithes and we may look confidently for large accessions to the membership during the coming year. We have the earnest of our expectation in a net increase in membership of over two hundred during the past year.

2. We further recommend that we as a church keep close to past usages of family worship, for in our opinion such an abandonment would weaken the spiritual life of our people.

A M Scott, PhD of the University of N B, presented the report of the church property committee.

On motion it was ordered by the conference that the trustees of Stanhope Methodist church on the York circuit, Charlottetown district, be permitted to sell the land on which the church stands and to remove the church to a larger and more convenient site, which has been generously given for this purpose.

Upon motion the request of Four Falls Trustees to sell a certain lot of land was denied.

Rev G A Ross presented the report of the Parsonage Aid Committee to the effect that Albert parsonage trustees be given a grant of \$300 next year to complete a new residence for the pastor of that place.

Evening Session.

Ordination service was the order of the evening session. The candidate for ordination, Jacob Heaney, B.A., at the call of the president, gave to him, and to the congregation a short description of his conversion and call to the ministry. He stated that when but a boy he had deep impressions of the fact that he must offer all his service to God. In the years of youth he brushed aside, to some extent, those convictions, but by the good offices of a Godly home, he acknowledged careful keeping. Under the labours of Rev C W Hamilton, in special evangelistic work assisted by Rev A D McLeod, he was stirred up by the Holy Spirit of God to be a Christian young man in profession and in purpose of heart. At once his attention was directed to obtaining an education. Four years were spent at Mount Allison University and two years in Mount Allison Theological College.

The charge to Mr. Heaney before entering upon the work as an ordained minister, was delivered by Rev Ralph Brecken, D D.

Tuesday Morning.

The station sheet was read and the chairman and financial secretaries were elected.

In St. John Rev Geo Steel of Portland church was elected chairman and Rev R W Weddall, B A, of Queen Square church, was elected secretary.

For Fredericton District, Rev Douglas Chapman, D D, of Fredericton church, was elected chairman, and Rev E C Turner, secretary.

In Chatham district Rev F H W Pickles, chairman, and Rev John Goldsmith, secretary.

In Sackville district, the president, Rev Geo W Fisher, chairman, and Rev Samuel Howard, B A, secretary.

Woodstock district—Rev James Crisp, chairman; W H Spargo, secretary.

St Stephen district—Rev John Read, D D, chairman; Rev Edward Bell, secretary.

Charlottetown district—Rev Richard Opie, chairman; Rev Jas W McConnell, B A, secretary.

Summerside district—Rev Geo T Dawson, B A chairman; Rev W J Howard, secretary.

R. W. John Goldsmith, Secretaries Treasurer of the sustentation fund, submitted a report which was adopted.

At twelve o'clock the conference adjourned until 2.30 p. m.

It is thought that the business of the conference will be finished this evening.

DIDN'T KNOW IT WAS LOADED.

Almost a Fatal Accident at Cole's Island.

Another accident through handling a revolver which, it was thought, was not loaded, occurred Sunday at Cole's Island, Washademoak. Two young men named Frank Strong and Edward Gilbert were examining a revolver, the weapon being in the hands of the former. Apparently, neither knew that any of the chambers was charged, but one was. The pistol became discharged when pointed in the direction of Gilbert, who received a bullet in his side, the ball also passing through the hand of Strong.

Dr Armstrong was at once called, and later a summons was sent Dr Earle, of Young's Cove. Both physicians consider Gilbert's injuries very serious, and late Sunday, it was thought he could not survive.

Strong's only harm is the wound in the hand. Gilbert is 17 years of age, and resides at Young's Cove Station, while Strong is 21 years old and lives at Cole's Island.

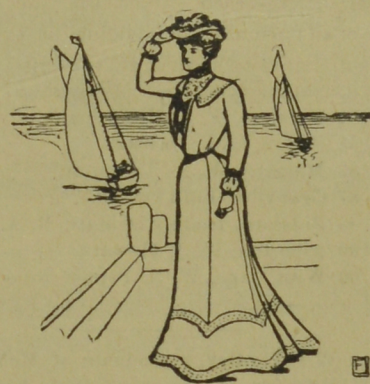
