Interesting Occurrences

FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

Hon David Mills, Minister of Justice, who is now in England, will leave for Canada on August 25.

Hailstones weighing three pounds each are reported to have fallen in Schlitz District, Russia. Three men were killed, and a lot of damage done to crops and live stock.

The wheat yield of Manitoba and the Northwest Territories is estimated at 55,000,000 to 65,000,000 bushels. Grave fears are entertained that enough laborers cannot be obtained to harvest it.

While out looking for berries on the farm of Geo Derrick, near Brockville, Ont., Thursday, F Payea, found the skeleton of the late Edward Holland, who has been missing since last July. Nothing but the white bones remained to mark the spot where the poor old man lay down to die, a stranger in a strange land. For weeks searching parties sought the missing man without success.

Mrs. Houle, wife of a farmer, who resides near Clarence Creek, Ontario, was fatally injured by an infuriated horse on Monday. She went into the stable to get the horse, in order to hitch it up. When she took hold of the halter the animal turned on her and knocked her down, afterwards tramping on her. One of her eyes was gouged out, her face was badly cut and several ribs were broken. Her screams brought help and the horse was driven from its victim. Mrs. Houle lost so much blood and was injured to such an extent that no hopes of her recovery are entertained.

Conservative journals find in the so-called delay in paying the enumerators a cause of complaint against the Government. There is not, however, any serious ground for criticism. It must be remembered that there are 8,635 enumerators, as compared with barely 5,000 in 1891, and it takes time to verify and audit such a large mass of accounts. Notwithstanding the work involved, up to 1 o'clock Thursday checks had been issued to the enumerators in 157 districts out of 210, and by the end of next week all will have received the remuneration to which they are entitled.

A story comes from London, in which Dr R J Wickstead, formerly Assistant Law Clerk in the House of Commons, figures. The doctor is now living in London, considerable means having been left him by his father. He is one of those entitled to a medal as a veteran of 1866, and wrote to Lord Strathcona asking the latter to arrange for the King to present it to him. The High Commissioner, in reply, wrote back, pointing out the difficulty of complying with the doctor's wish. Then Dr Wickstead waxed very angry and informed Lord Strathcona that he was paid for doing such things as the former had suggested.

While practising at the Green Point camp, Capetown, for the reception to the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, Bugler Dunn met with an accident. His horse bolted and fell. One of Dunn's legs was broken. Dunn is the fifteen-year-old bugler of the 1st Royal Dublin Fusiliers who was wounded three times at the battle of Colenso while sounding his orders. He was one of the first to cross the Tugela after sounding the order to "advance." When he returned to England to recuperate Queen Victoria presented him with a silver mounted bugle. He was afterwards sent back to South Africa at his own request.

PRINCE WILLIAM.

July 24.—There took place at Prince William on the 17th inst., with startling suddenness the death of John J. Rosborough, one of our most respected citizens. Since the early spring Mr. Rosborough had been in failing health, and his medical adviser had intimated that his heart action was not good. His friends were hopeful, however, and by the greater number of them the end was not looked for. Deceased will be missed, not only in the home, where he leaves a sorrowing widow and two sons, but in the community. For a quarter of a century he was a member in full communion of the Presbyterian congregation of this place, and his life was in keeping with his Christian profession.

John I Rosborough was a man among men. None was more willing to oblige a neighbor or lend a helping hand. His

word was as good as his bond. He was kindly and genial in disposition and was a true friend. To his church he was faithful, and was not only one of its pillars, but was also, in many respects, one of its ornaments. His funeral which was large took place on the 19th. After divine service by Rev Wm Ross the remains were interred in the burying ground near the Presbyterian church. Mr Rosborough was a brother of Rev James Rosborough, of Musquodoboit Harbor, Halifax, N. S., and was in the 61st year of age.

On Monday, the 15th inst, a severe wind storm accompanied with rain struck a barn owned by Thomas Rosborough of Prince William and unroofed it completely. A barn lately owned by John R Scott at Lower Pokiok was also considerably damaged on the same afternoon. It will be remembered that Mr Rosborough, about three years ago lost his house by fire and now the wind takes up the work of demolition. He takes the quiet calm view of the matter, however, and he has the sympathy and should have the help of all his neighbors.

CARTRIDGE IN CIGARETTE.

The Victim of an Explosion Asks Dam-
ages of \$10,000 From the Manu-
facturers.

The papers in a suit to recover \$10,000 damages for personal injuries brought by Edward Weinschreiber, a tailor, living on North Fifth Street, Brooklyn, against Aaron Shrik and Isreal Behrmer, were filed Wednesday in the County Clerk's office, Brooklyn N. Y.

The plaintiff alleges that while he was at work in a shop on Metropolitan Avenue on June 27, he sent a boy to a nearby tobacco store for a package of a certain brand of cigarettes manufactured by the defendants. Weinschreiber alleges that while he was smoking one of the cigarettes it exploded in his hand, a blank cartridge having been concealed in it. His hand was so much injured, he claims, that it was necessary to amputate the thumb and two fingers at St Catherine's Hospital. The plaintiff alleges that the presence of the cartridge in the cigarette was due to negligence on the part of the defendants.

The defendants' answer is a general denial of negligence or responsibility in the matter.
