FORCED TO EVACUATE.

London, July 27.—A telegram from
Kitchener at Pretoria to the war office
reports that the detachment of Steinacher
horse occupying Bremersdorp was forced
to evacuate July 23 by a superior force of
Boers.

The detachment fought its way to Lem-
bobo, a distance of 16 miles, losing in
killed, wounded and several missing.

CASE OF CRUELTY.

SHAMROCK II FOR NEW YORK.

NEW TROTTING RECORD.

trotting stallion, again demonstrated that

new world's record for both sexes, re-
placing the former world's record of 2.03½
held by The Abbott.

LOOKING FOR HARVESTERS.
