MURDERED A PRIEST.

New York, May 17.—The dead and partly decomposed body of Rev. Father Phillips of St. Gabriel's church, Hazelton, Pa., a priest, who has been known as the "miners' friend" was found in the room of Kirk Stanley, massage operator this morning. The operator was arrested on suspicion. Recently Phillips conferred with J. Pierpont Morgan, and asked him to use his influence to avert a threatened strike in the coal regions of Pennsylvania.

FACILITIES INADEQUATE.

Montreal, May 17.—Sir Rivers Wilson, President of the Grand Trunk Railway, accompanied by Lady Wilson, arrived this morning. In an interview he stated that the company was forced to go to Portland with its export business because Montreal harbor's facilities are wholly inadequate to handle it. Sentiment must not deter the company from making such arrangements as best suited.

THE TROUBLE AT ALBANY.

CANADA'S POPULATION.

Ottawa, May 17.—A prominent member of the census staff said yesterday that only about half the schedule sheets of Ottawa had been gone over yet, but with the same increase as shown so far, the population of the capital would reach nearly 70,000. He estimates the returns for all Canada will reveal 6,000,000 people.

Cracksmen at Eastport.

Eastport, Me., May 16.—Unknown burglars forced an entrance into the office in Washington county railroad station here early this morning and got

away with money and checks amounting to nearly \$350. With a hatchet stolen from the toolhouse entrance was gained. The combination was broken off, and powder was used in breaking into the safe. The door was blown across the office, passing through a partition into the ladies' writing room. About \$130 in cash was stolen, beside the checks. The work is evidently that of experienced hands. Several petty burglaries have occurred here recently, but the police seem unable to locate the thieves.

Young Man Burned Alive at Snowball's Mill.

Chatham, May 17.—A dreadful accident occurred at Snowball's mill Wednesday night when Cloran Guthro, an employee in the mill, met a horrible death. He and two other men were attending the furnace where the refuse was being burned. His two companions went outside to get a breath of air and were only absent about ten minutes. When they returned Guthro was not at his post. They called him and searched for him but without success, and thinking that possibly he had fallen into the fire they raked the ashes and found only a few bones and his heart, proving that such had been his terrible fate. An inquiry was held yesterday. The verdict was accidental death. The unfortunate man was 18 years old and belonged to Tracadie. His father and two brothers are employed in town.
