Will Get a Commission.

A Halifax paper is authority for the statement that Lieut. Gerald Farrell, who is at present in Ottawa the guest of Hon. W. S. Fielding, is to get a commission in the regular Canadian force. Lieut. Farrell, who lately took a course at the R. C. R. I. here, has lately been attending the Royal Military College at Kingston.

To Visit the North Shore.

The annual meeting of the recently organized Bay Chaleur Tourist Association is to be held at New Carlisle, Gaspé County P. Q. on June 5th. The Fredericton Tourist Association has been invited to send representatives to the meeting, and it is quite likely that President Chestnut and Messrs F. B. Coleman and F. B. Edgecombe will attend.

The Truro Globe Trotter.

Karl Creelman, the Truro globe trotter, when last heard from was at Hull, England, having worked his way from Egypt on a trading vessel. To a Hull newspaper reporter he said: "I leave Hull tomorrow for the north of Scotland, and shall come down to London, calling to see the Glasgow Exhibition, and then go on to Dover and on to the continent. I wish to go through Germany, Switzerland, Bavaria, Italy, and up again through France, come on to Dover, cycle again through to Cardiff, ship to the south of

Ireland and then go right up to the north of Ireland, come back to Liverpool and home via Halifax in November." Up to the time he reached Hull, Creelman had cycled 11,000 miles, travelled 1,300 miles on foot, and 31,000 miles by sea.

Shipping will be Light.

It is hardly likely from present indications that there will be as many schooners visit Fredericton this season as in previous years. The crafts that come up the river are engaged in the coasting trade, and the owners claim that they can obtain all the freight they can handle without making the eighty mile voyage to Fredericton. An up river mill owner, who was in town a few days, stated that his firm would have sufficient lumber for shipment to load twenty five schooners, and he had not yet been able to secure a single charter.

Alerts' Pitcher Arrives.

Popp, the Alerts imported pitcher, arrived at St. John yesterday afternoon from Boston on the steamer State of Maine. The Sun says he is a well set up young fellow of about 150 pounds, and has a record for doing good work with the teams in and around Boston. His friends claim for him the usual qualifications, a barrel of speed, a bunch of curves and good control. Harry Joep, who recommended Popp, is due to arrive Tuesday next, has been engaged to play in the opening games of the New England league.

University Lien Case.

An application was made before Judge Wilson yesterday in the suit of Tabor and O'Neill vs. W. H. Butler and Ald Maxwell of St. John, and also in the suit of R. Chestnut & Sons against the same defendants to set aside the lien on the new science building of the U. N. B. The application was made by J. D. Hazen on behalf of the defendant, Maxwell, and an order was made to set aside the lien on condition that the defendant pay into the bank an amount sufficient to satisfy the claims against him.

Teachers' Association.

The Fredericton Teachers' Association are to hold their annual reception in the Assembly Hall of the High School building this evening. A musical and literary programme will be carried out, and there will be addresses by Dr. J. R. Inch and John Brittain. About one hundred invitations have been issued for the function, principally to members of the school board and those engaged in educational work. The High School orchestra is to be in attendance.
