THE EXHIBITION.

Wednesday was a great day at the exhibition, nearly five thousand people paid admissions to see the excellent show, and all were loud in praise of it. The main building was, of course, a great attraction to the people, but the live stock departments also came in for much notice. All the departments were in full running order and everything proceeded without a hitch. The management of the exhibition are more than pleased with the success of their efforts to make the exhibition go, and are to be most warmly congratulated on its extent and character. The attendance today was also large, considering the unfavorable weather. This evening the Fredericton firemen are to take a hand, giving a torchlight procession and a big display of fireworks on the grounds.

Every citizen should take the opportunity of visiting the show before it closes tomorrow evening.

A pathetic incident occurred at Canton, Ohio, Wednesday during the lying in state of the remains of the late President McKinley. Late in the afternoon an aged man, leaning upon two crutches, appeared at the exit of the McKinley home. The sentry said he had orders to allow nobody to pass through that door. In a short time he again made the same request, in his feeble condition he was not able to stand in the line. "I fought in his regiment during the war," he said, "and I just want to lay this flag on his coffin and then keep it as a remembrance of the time I saw him last." He was allowed to pass in.

With sorrowful hearts the citizens of the United States, today took a last farewell of their martyred president whose remains were today laid away in their last resting place in the city of Canton, Ohio. The exhibition of grief at McKinley's tragic death is sincere. The victim of assassination, by his simple manners, kindly nature, clean life and great public services, enshrined himself in the memory of his countrymen, and is as sincerely mourned as the great Lincoln himself.

A few days ago the Halifax Herald, organ of the Nova Scotia local opposition, boasted of a strong ticket nominated by its party in Annapolis to oppose Attorney General Longley and his colleague Mr. Bancroft, but the triumph was of short duration. Elliott and Crowe, the gentlemen selected by the opposition convention have absolutely declined the sacrifice.

Montreal's welcome to the Duke and Duchess of York was a rouser, and must have deeply impressed Their Royal Highnesses with the deep seated, enthusiastic character of the city's loyalty. It is unfortunate that both at Quebec and Montreal rain marred the royal receptions.

Mayor Daniel of St. John has a gorgeous robe for wear in welcoming the Duke, but he will not be in it with Major Morris of Ottawa, who will appear attired in a cocked hat, black knee breeches, a scarlet robe trimmed with otter and lined with white silk, low shoes with big silver buttons and black stockings.

The Liberals of Nova Scotia have candidates in the field in every county in the province, while the Conservatives have none in eight counties. Official nomination takes place next Wednesday, and polling one week later.

The Dominion government proclaimed today a day of general mourning throughout Canada for the death of President McKinley.

Everybody will regret the unfortunate accident which befel the popular Minister of Militia at Quebec.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.

Large Gathering from York, Sunbury and Queen's

MEETING TO BE HELD IN THE UNIVERSITY TO-MORROW AFTERNOON.

The Enrolment up to Noon Thursday.

The annual session of York, Sunbury and Queens Counties Teachers' Institute opened at 10 o'clock this morning with President Amos O'Blenes in the chair.

Miss Ella Thorne, Fin. Secy., submitted her report. The enrolment fee was fixed at 50 cts for gentlemen and 25 cts for lady teachers.

A letter was read from Chancellor Harrison, of the University, inviting the teachers to hold one session at the University and to visit the new science building. It was decided to accept the invitation on Friday afternoon.

President O'Blenes delivered an address on "Failures" touching on the chief reasons for such failures such as irregular attendance, inexperienced teachers, caused by low salaries, lack of practical work in the schools, and changing of teachers in country districts.

Rev. Mr. Howard of Sheffield addressed the teachers' comparing the schools of England and New Zealand with our own. Principal Foster also spoke referring to the low salaries received by our teachers. A committee consisting of Messrs Bridges, Foster and Barker and Misses Harvey and Parker were appointed to nominate officers for the ensuing year.
