

THE HORSE RACES.

Great Sport at the Driving Park Wednesday Afternoon.

OVER ONE THOUSAND SPECTATORS IN ATTENDANCE.

Bert Lint's Sligo Won in the 2.35 Class.

GOOD WORK BY A ST. STEPHEN HORSE IN THE 2.28 CLASS.

The horse races at the park Wednesday, under the auspices of the Fredericton Park association, passed off very successfully and were witnessed by upwards of one thousand spectators. Local horse fanciers were present in force, and among the spectators were noticed a good sprinkling of horsemen from St. Stephen, Woodstock and the Miramichi. The track was in fair condition, but there was no very fast time made in any of the races, though all were hotly contested.

2.35 Class.
The first event of the afternoon, was the 2.35 class which had five starters viz, H C Jewett's, Marshall Ney, driven by Fred McCoy; A B Wetmore's, Dr Franklin, driven by Harvey McCoy; Byron Phair's, Midnight, driven by D J Stockford; Bert Lint's, Sligo, driven by the owner, and C H Sterling's Lady S, also driven by the owner. The first heat was captured by Marshall Ney, after a very pretty exhibition in 2.42½, the fastest time made in the race. He went the quarter in 41, the half in 1.22, and passed the three quarter pole in 2.02. The horses got away well together in the second heat, with Marshall Ney slightly in the lead. Dr Franklin and Sligo both passed him on the back stretch, and it was quite a struggle between these two for first place. A bad break by Franklin put Sligo in the lead on the home stretch and he captured the heat in 2.45½. He made the quarter in 41, the half in 1.21½, the three quarter pole in 2.04. Marshall Ney finished third but was set back to fourth place for running.

In the third heat Sligo had the pole, but was passed on the back stretch by Lady S, who made a spurt which surprised the spectators. The plucky little mare was overhauled by Dr. Franklin, securing a good lead which he maintained until the finish. His time was 41, 1.22, 2.05½ and 2.44½. In the fourth heat Franklin took the lead and kept it until the home stretch was reached, when he was headed by Sligo who captured the heat amidst great enthusiasm. The time by quarters was 1, 1.22, 2.05½ and 2.46½. Marshall Ney was sent to the stable by the judges at the end of the fourth heat for giving an unsteady gait. The fifth heat was one of the prettiest of the race and was captured by Sligo, who never once lifted his nose. The time was 41, 1.23½, 2.04½ and 2.46½.

2.28 Class.

There were only three starters in this class, Synomin the St. John flyer, having been withdrawn at the last moment on account of lameness. The starters were Tutrix, owned by E H Barter of St. Stephen, Fred McCoy's Deceiver and Fearless, a black stallion, owned by W C Bull of Woodstock. The latter did good honest work, and might have won had he been in slower company. The horses got away well together in the first heat, but Tutrix soon took the lead and maintained it till the mile was reached. The time in quarters was 38, 1.15½, 1.55, 2.33½. The second heat was a pretty contest, between Tutrix and Deceiver, all the way through, and it looked like anybody's heat until the finish, when Tutrix had a length to the good. The time was 38, 1.15, 1.54½ and 2.32½, the fastest made during the afternoon. In the third heat the horses got away in splendid order, but a break by the St. Stephen mare on the back stretch gave Deceiver the lead. The little mare, however, soon settled down to business, and managed to overhaul and pass the gelding before the home stretch was reached, and passed under the wire a length to the good. The time was 39, 1.18, 1.57 and 2.34½.

Running Race.

The running race, was the most exciting event of the afternoon and was greatly enjoyed by the spectators. The starters were Peter Clinch's Hillocks, ridden by Jockey McGuire of Lowell; Phair's Campagne ridden by Dave Duffy, and Duffy's Bye-Gone-Days, handled by George Haney. They got a splendid start but Bye-gone Days soon fell behind and the

others made the circuit of the track neck and neck. There was so little space between them at the finish, that many of the spectators thought it a dead heat but the judges decided that Hillocks had won. His time was 58 seconds for the half mile, a 1.56 clip. The second heat was another splendid struggle between Campagne and Hillocks, but the little St. John flyer forged ahead on the home stretch and won by a length, in 59 seconds.

The judges were J F Watson, of St. John; John Kilburn and Dougall McCatherine, of Fredericton. C J Ward was starter and the timers were C. W. Bell and James McGivern, of St. John.

Thanks to Starter Watson there was very little time lost in scoring, and no tedious waits between heats. Phair's was out of condition, and had to be withdrawn at the end of the third heat.
