

## MONTREAL'S GREETING

## CITY WENT WILD OVER THE DUKE AND DUCHESS.

They Drove through Streets Thronged with Cheering Multitudes.

## THEIR ROYAL HIGHNESSES

Both Received Honorary Degree from McGill University.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Montreal, Sept. 19.—The second day of the royal visit opened with rain, but later on the sun broke through the clouds and the downpour ceased.

At 10.30 His Royal Highness and the Duchess visited McGill college where the honorary degree LL.D. was conferred on them both by the Chancellor Lord Strathcona, and an address from governors of the college was read.

Great enthusiasm was caused when Lord Strathcona personally enrobed them in appropriate hoods.

His Royal Highness then proceeded to the Medical University proper and formally opened the new addition.

Their Royal Highnesses then visited the Royal Victoria Hospital, at one the Anglican synod and later Ville Marie Convent.

All public functions were called off owing to McKinley's funeral.

The royal pair are enthusiastically greeted where ever they appeared.

Montreal, Sept. 19.—Montreal's welcome to the Duke and Duchess was a grand one. Estimates of the number of people who saw the royal procession from Viger station to Lord Strathcona's residence vary. Some put it as high as half a million. This is probably a little exaggerated. There were certainly 300,000 people on the line of march. It was the biggest thing Montreal has ever seen, and the enthusiasm was quite as great as the crowds.

For hours a vast crowd of expectant people had completely encircled Place Viger station. Viger Gardens were crowded as never before in their history. The royal guard of honor was drawn up near the station wall to receive the royal visitors. Within a very short time after the stopping of the train their Royal Highnesses and their suite stepped upon the station platform and were received by the mayor, Alderman Sadler, Hon Geo Drummond, Hon Robt MacKey and other prominent citizens.

The Governor-General and his aides, the mayor in his robes of office, His Royal Highness, clad in the rich uniform of a British admiral; the Duchess of York in gown of dark shade and her rich furs, which were about her neck, and Viscount Crichton and the Duke of Roxburghs in their robes and the elaborate uniform of the Horse Guards made an exceedingly brilliant spectacle as the group entered the station. Passing along the pathway of carpet, the distinguished group descended the steps to Craig street, and was presently ascending the richly carpeted steps of the dais which had been erected for the purpose of receiving the royal visitors.

When the Duke and Duchess appeared in the doorway of the station, facing the Viger Gardens, mighty shouts went up, followed by a continuous roar of greeting, which sounded at times like the sharp crackling of musketry. The scene upon which their Royal Highnesses looked out before descending the steps was one which was well calculated to bring the smile of pleasure which mantled the features of the Duke as he glanced straight ahead and beheld the shouting wall of standing humanity which encircled the richly decorated dais. Above it was the green foliage of the trees in the gardens, overshadowing and mellowing the inspiring spectacle. Glancing away to the right, and Duke saw other gesticulating and shouting thousands. To the left he saw a beautiful design among the multitude the children's living flag. Seven hundred and fifty of the school children of the city formed a pleasing spectacle, a living Union Jack, forty feet long by sixty broad. Colored caps and jackets formed the pattern of the flags. Above all the shouting was the booming of distant cannon and the merry ringing of joy bells.

Conducted by the mayor, the royal couple and suite ascended the steps of the dais amid loud cheers. After a little delay, during which His Royal Highness and the Duchess of York took the opportunity to gaze upon the vast crowd about them, the mayor began his address.

The Duke made a very graceful reply, and when he had finished the presentation of South African war medals to members of the 2nd Battalion Royal Canadian Regiment of Infantry, Canadian Mounted Rifles, Royal Canadian Dragoons, Royal Canadian Artillery, Strathcona Horse and Canadian Scouts took place.

The streets were lined with troops, behind which the people were massed. From start to finish there was continual cheering. The Duke and Duchess smiled and bowed as the populace vociferated its welcome.

Rain began to fall and the remainder of the procession was made on the trot. The residence of Lord Strathcona was reached at 4.10 p.m.

As the royal carriage drove up, Lord and Lady Strathcona advanced to meet the royal visitors and welcomed them.

Last night Lord Strathcona gave a dinner, to which 125 sat down. There was a torch-light procession by the Athletic Association, etc., in which 5,000 participated; a beautiful illumination of the city and fireworks.

Oliver Mathieu, Principal of Laval; Oliver Howland, Mayor of Toronto; Major F S Maude, Governor General's secretary. To be Knight Bachelor: Thos G Shanahan, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company.

## MEMORIAL SERVICE.

## A NAVAL HORROR.

British Torpedo Boat Destroyer—Fastest in the World.

LOST WITH SIXTY FIVE LIVES IN THE NORTH SEA.

Boilers Were Being Tested and Exploded.

BODIES OF DEAD AND SOME OF THE SURVIVORS PICKED UP.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

London, Sept. 19.—The torpedo boat destroyer Cobra has foundered in the North Sea, as a result of an air explosion.

The vessel was enroute from the yard of her builders, the Armstrongs of Newcastle, to Portsmouth, and carried a navigating crew of from fifty to sixty men.

It is reported that all were lost with the exception of about a dozen.

The first intimation of the disaster was the arrival of a fishing boat at Yarmouth with six bodies picked up in the vicinity of the spot, where the Cobra was last seen.

Twelve survivors were landed at Middeboro this morning.

The Cobra was a turbine engined vessel and was undergoing a boiler test. She was the fastest vessel in the world, having made a record of 37.7 knots or 43.5 miles an hour.

The Cobra had on board 42 naval men and 35 men in the employ of the contractors. The loss of life was therefore 65.

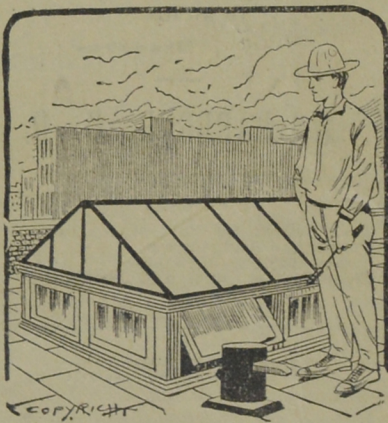

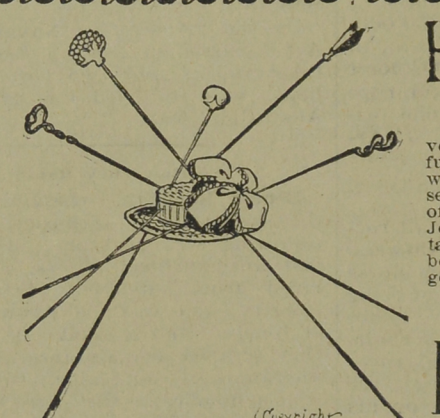
