Eighteenth Annual Session Opened in Methodist Church.

AN ADDRESS OF WELCOME BY MAYOR CROCKET.

And a Reply from Rev T. F. Fotheringham.

A PARTIAL LIST OF THE DELEGATES IN ATTENDANCE.

Beautiful weather marked the opening of the 18th annual convention of the New Brunswick Sunday School Association, which met in the Methodist church at 2.30 o'clock this afternoon. The decorating committee, with Jas T Wilson at their head, have been hard at work for several days and the result of their labors is shown in the attractive appearance of the edifice wherein the convention will hold its sessions. The pulpit platform has been transformed into a perfect bower of potted plants and flowers, while flags, bright colored bunting and appropriate mottoes, are in evidence on every side.

The proceedings opened with devotional exercises led by Rev. J. H. McDonald, pastor of the Baptist church. Upwards of one hundred and fifty delegates were in their places, and joined heartily in the singing.

In the absence of the president, Rev. Mr. Carr of Campbellton, J. Willard Smith of St. John, was called to the chair, and accepted the honor in a neat speech. He afterwards introduced Mayor Crockett, who delivered a short address, heartily welcoming the delegates on behalf of the citizens of Fredericton. He spoke of the noble work in which those persons were engaged, and expressed the hope that their sessions would be pleasant and profitable. His Worship's remarks were listened to with close attention and heartily applauded.

Rev. T. F. Fotheringham, of St. John, on behalf of the delegates, returned thanks for the kindly sentiments expressed by the Mayor. He spoke of the two previous occasions when the association had met in this city, and remarked that both were remembered by him with pleasure. On one of those occasions he had been selected to fill the high office of president. He made a humorous reference to the term Celestial city, as applied to Fredericton, and intimated that in the summer season he preferred St. John fog to Fredericton heat. He spoke eloquently of the work done in Sunday schools, and experienced pleasure at the large attendance, which was proof of an increasing interest in the cause.

WALLACE MUST GO

All Hope of His Recovery Has Been Abandoned.

HAS BEEN PROMINENT IN CANADIAN POLITICS FOR MANY YEARS

And Held Office in the Conservative Government.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Woodbridge, Ont., Oct 8.—Hon Clarke Wallace is very low and cannot live many hours longer.

Two specialists arrived from Toronto this morning, but they hold out no hope.

[Mr. Wallace has for some years been a prominent figure in Canadian politics. He is of Irish parentage and was born in Woodbridge fifty-seven years ago. He has represented West York continuously since 1878, his majority in 1896 (4068) being the largest on record in any election in Canada. In December, 1892, he was appointed Controller of Customs, but resigned that office three years later as a protest against the action of the government in proposing remedial legislation. Mr. Wallace has been Grand Master of the Orange Association of British America since 1887, and president of the Triennial Council of the world since 1891.]

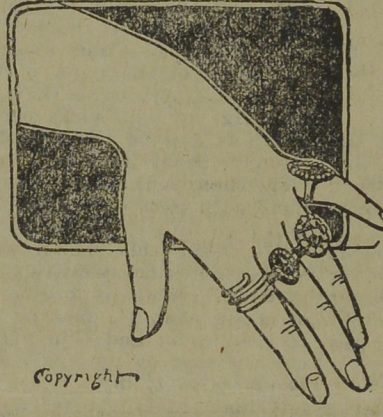
