## NOTES OF THE NEWS.

Interesting Occurrences  
Paraphrased for Her-  
ald Readers.

### FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

A Boer commando has appeared at Barrydale, 140 miles from Cape Town.

Locomotives tested in Egypt show that the British engines are markedly superior to the American.

Commandants Dewet and Myrburg have issued proclamations stating that they will shoot all armed troops captured after September 15.

J. C. Brown, M. P. P., of New Westminster, has been sworn in as a member of the Dunsmair Cabinet, and Mr. McBride, Minister of Mines, who opposed Mr. Brown's selection, has resigned.

The Crown Prince of Prussia will visit the United States in 1903. Emperor William has mapped out a tour of the world for his son, and wishes that the young man shall see as much of other countries as possible. The Prince will go to India next year and study the government of that part of the British Empire.

It is understood that the Premier and his colleagues will be on hand to welcome the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, when they arrive at Quebec on the 16th inst. Sir Wilfrid Laurier will accompany the Royal couple on their trip across the continent and back, and he will therefore be absent from the Capital for about four or five weeks. The Premier may possibly go over to Newfoundland with the Duke and Duchess.

The Wilson line steamer Buffalo, which passed the Lizard, Wednesday night, and signalled that she had broken her shaft, arrived at Falmouth next day. The captain reported that a New York newspaper man, named Joy, had committed suicide by taking poison during the voyage. In a letter to the captain he requested that his remains be buried at sea, which was done. Joy wrote that he took the voyage especially to commit suicide. He directed that certain of his belongings be sent to Josephine Joy, and left presents for the stewards and stewardesses.

Last Wednesday night a short distance below Woodstock a buggy in which were L. A. Vanwart and Mrs. Camber, and one containing George Saunders and Whit Slipp came into collision, caused by both drivers turning out to make passage for a bicycle rider. Both buggies were overturned and considerably damaged. Mr. Vanwart's face was injured. Mr. Slipp was uninjured. Mr. Saunders was injured about the face. Mrs. Camber had the bone of her hand broken and a bad scalp wound which necessitated several stitches. The bicycle rider was unhurt.

Edward M. Lingell, a tramp, who attempted to assault the 4-year-old daughter of Walter Perry in Nebraska, Saturday, was twice strung up to a telegraph pole by irate citizens, made to confess, and then turned loose and warned to leave the county. Lingell was captured by the child's father. Fifty neighbors quickly gathered and strung him up on a telegraph pole, but lowered him before he was seriously hurt. He was allowed to pray, and send word to his mother, and then was hauled up a second time. He was left suspended until almost unconscious, when he was again lowered. On further consideration, the crowd determined that Lingell was not strong mentally, and, after swearing he would leave the county at once, he was released.

At a meeting of the St. Andrew's Society at Montreal Wednesday night, it was decided to erect an arch on Dorchester street west, near the Robertson property on the occasion of the approaching visit to Montreal of the Duke and Duchess of York. Past President James Wright submitted a very pleasing drawing of what it was intended the arch should represent, namely, the old toll booth of "Auld Reekie." The design shows that the arch will be baronial in character, and that it will be constructed in such a manner as to permit of its being occupied by pipers, etc., during the passing of the Royal party beneath. It will be 51 feet high and 60 feet wide, while the central opening will be 26 feet wide and 17 feet high. The ramparts will be manned by pipers and Scotchmen in Highland costume.

## FOUR YOUNG ELOPERS

Take Trip to Savannah to  
Avoid Parents' Wrath.

### INTERESTING QUARTET FROM EXCELLENT STATEN ISLAND FAMILIES.

Had Been Secretly Married, and  
Di'n't Dare to Have  
it Known.

New York, Sept. 5.—Just before the steamer City of Augusta left pier 29 yesterday afternoon two girls, clinging to the arms of two youths, hurried up the gang plank. None of the party carried baggage, and when the big steamship swung out into the stream the looks of concern and embarrassment on their faces gave way to smiles of relief.

The four were elopers who, after being secretly married, had taken passage for Savannah to give their parents' anger time to cool.

The girls were Miss Mamie Springer, of Port Richmond, S. I., and Miss Dolly Hines, of Stapleton. Neither is 18 years old.

Miss Springer had secretly married Frederick Messell, a youth of 19, who lives with his parents at Concord, S. I. Miss Hines at the same time had married Charles Dagnac, son of a wealthy contractor. Dagnac is not yet 20.

The double wedding took place Monday. For several weeks the boys had been very attentive to the two girls. Because of their youth the parents of all were opposed when engagements were suggested. They were told by their mothers that marrying was out of the question at this time. Cladestine meetings were held. On Monday the girls met and went to Concord, where the boys were waiting for them. The four then hurried to the home of Rev Dr. Thompson, in Concord.

"We want to be married," they told the minister.

"We want to have a double wedding at once."

Each couple were witnesses to the marriage of the other couple. After the ceremony the girls, now badly frightened, hurried to their own homes and their youthful husbands went to theirs. Mrs. Messell has been living at the home of her grandmother. She announced yesterday at noon that she was going to South beach to meet friends. In a shirt waist and cloth skirt the girl left home and went directly to the home of Mrs. Dagnac. The two girls then came to New York, where they met their husbands. All agreed that it would not only be difficult, but dangerous, to break the news to the parents. They agreed also that the marriages could not be kept secret longer and that it would be safer for all concerned to catch a steamship and take a wedding trip to Savannah.

Without a change of clothing, even as much as an extra collar, the brides and bridegrooms started for the Savannah steamship. They arrived almost when the cry sounded "All ashore." They had not time to purchase tickets and were obliged to do so after getting on the boat.

When a press reporter called at the Stringer home last night the members of the family were in ignorance of the secret weddings.

"My child married?" exclaimed the grandmother. "It isn't true, I can't believe it."

When convinced that such was the case there was indignation.

"If Mamie has eloped with young Messell she shall never enter this house again," the grandmother declared. "I have no objections to Mr. Messell, but my granddaughter is entirely too young to be a wife. She is hardly more than a baby. I understand now why she has acted so strangely since yesterday. She seemed in a high state of nervousness and avoided talking to us. When she left here today she put on her best clothes. So afraid was she that we should suspect her of going to meet you Messell that she hurried from the house. Had she taken any garments with her except the ones she wore we would have become suspicious. She knew this and has gone on her wedding trip with absolutely

nothing except what she wore on her back.

"I am thoroughly disgusted. If I had known that the child was determined to marry I would have made it impossible for her to have done so. Now that she has married, I will say that this house is barred against her."

Mrs. Messell's mother was so shocked at the news of her daughter's elopement that she could not speak. "This is a great trial," was all she could say.

There was equal indignation and surprise at the Hines home. It is believed, however, that Mrs. Dagnac and her young husband will be forgiven.

What Messell's and Dagnac's parents will do when they are convinced that their young sons have taken wives, remains to be seen.

### SMUGGLED IN \$25 000 IN JEWELS

Prominent Chicago Man will Suffer that  
Loss and About a \$10,000 Fine.

Chicago, Sept. 5.—Diamonds and other valuables worth \$25,000, which were recently slipped into the country by a prominent Chicago man on his return from Europe without the payment of duty, have been seized by J. J. Crowley, special agent of the treasury department in this city.

The jewels which were purchased, it is said, in Paris, have been turned over by Mr. Crowley to William Penn, Noxon, collector of customs in this city. He will hold them until orders for their disposal are finally received from Washington.

An effort is being made to settle the case with as little publicity as possible. It is probable that the owner of the valuables will pay all the costs, which will amount to something like \$10,000, and thus avoid prosecution.

A despatch from Cape Town says the British ship Cromartysire caught fire at sea and was abandoned by her crew last Saturday. She was bound from Leith for Algoa Bay with coal. The Cromartysire's captain, the despatch adds, was drowned, but sixteen of the crew made Cape St. Francis in safety. A vessel supposed to be the Cromartysire was later seen in tow passing Cape St. Francis. The Cromartysire has a bad record. Disaster seems to have followed persistently in her wake. It was she that sunk the French line steamship Burgogne, with 535 persons on board, near Sable Island July 4, 1898.

## LOBSTERS MADE FUN

Great Excitement at City  
Point Headhouse.

### PEOPLE FEVERISH UNTIL THEY LEARNED THEY WERE BE- ING HOAXED.

Great excitement prevailed at the headhouse, City Point, yesterday afternoon, which was not abated until people realized that they were the victims of a hoax. The scenes they had witnessed were only the consummation of plans well made and carried out by the Lobster club of South Boston, an organization of expert swimmers and divers.

At the special invitation of the managers of the headhouse, the club provided a water entertainment that excelled anything of the kind it had ever attempted, and which kept the crowd at fever point until the exhibition was concluded with a tub race and other races.

About 2 p.m. a small rowboat put off from the South Boston yacht club, the occupants apparently being an old man and a gay colored woman, but in reality they were George Cudahy and Manuel De Freitas, respectively. The former was attired in an appropriate costume, as was also the latter, who also carried a large rag doll which looked like a baby.

The peculiar actions of the rower the old man, splashing of the oars and the general uncertainty of the direction the boat was taking first attracted notice of the people on shore. Pretending to arrange her dress more comfortably opposite the sea shore the colored woman handed the doll to her male escort, who dropped it with a thud on the bottom of the boat.

When the doll was dropped the colored woman attacked the man. The woman, in the row, fell overboard. The man (Cudahy) tried to rescue the woman and he in turn upset into the briny.

Charles Hatch, another member of the club, who was basking in the sun on the beach, saw the predicament of the couple, and without removing his clothes he jumped into the water and swam to their rescue, but the couple could not be found. Hatch struggled to keep himself above water, while the couple managed to come to the surface just the other side of the boat.

By this time the crowd thought that all three would surely drown and there were many cries for assistance.

John Doherty was on the pier, not far from the headhouse, watching the yachts float by and amused at the antics of the bathers, when he, too, saw the struggle in the water, and quickly jumped over the rail, to the amazement of the people, and he, too, endeavored to rescue those thought to be drowning.

Away down on the pier was George H. Russell, another Lobster, with best Sunday rig on, and appearing as if he was about to keep an engagement with some friend. Seeing the danger of the people in the water he was impressed with the idea of rescuing them, and he likewise vaulted the fence and soon was in the water.

Isaac Ogden and his brother, Lewis Ogden, were chatting away on one of the benches on the park, and they swam out to the unfortunates. They succeeded in bringing ashore De Freitas, apparently unconscious. They worked on him 10 minutes, as he was stretched out on the beach, and then, being unsuccessful brought him into the headhouse. Dr. Mayers, another of the Lobster club, was hastily summoned, although he "happened" to be near there all the time. After heroic efforts Dr. Mayers brought De Freitas around, much to the satisfaction of the curious spectators.

The greatest excitement occurred when the colored woman (?) was on the beach and the Lobsters were endeavoring to bring her to her senses. Some of the spectators thought that she was being handled too roughly, and they expostulated in no uncertain terms. The colored woman was slapped and beaten and kicked about, a method that appeared peculiar to those who witnessed the means of resuscitation. So angry did the crowd become at one time that additional police were telephoned for, and patrolmen O'Brien and Ness were soon on the scene.

When the colored woman was revived and appeared in the garb of a lobster the crowd roared. Then they understood the trick and watched the races.
