Complimentary Address to
Judge Gregory.

ST. JOHN JURYMEN EXPRESS
SATISFACTION.

At His Honor's Elevation to the
Bench.

(Special to Daily Herald).

St. John, Sept. 6.—On the re-assembling of the circuit court this afternoon, the following address was presented to the presiding Judge, Hon. Geo. F. Gregory, by the grand jury:

Honorable George F. Gregory, Judge of the Supreme Court, Province of New Brunswick:

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOR: As members of the Grand Jury in attendance at the Circuit Court for the City and County of Saint John, we desire to welcome you upon your first official visit to this section of the province.

We believe that we are expressing the general opinion when we state that in no part of New Brunswick—not excepting your own beautiful City of Fredericton—was the news of your elevation to the Bench received with greater favor than in the City and County of Saint John. You had long been known as a lawyer of eminence—the result of a judicial mind, an intimate knowledge of human nature, deep reading and untiring industry.

It is stated as a first principle that the authority of a Court of Justice is founded on the soundness of its decisions; and again, that pure, efficient and authoritative Courts of Justice are the most precious possession a people can enjoy. In calling your Honor to your present high position, the appointing power showed that it had a proper regard for these principles; and we feel satisfied that in the discharge of your duties you will achieve a reputation equal to the anticipations of those to whom your elevation gave such genuine satisfaction.

As a barrister in Court, in addition to conducting your cases with ability, earnestness and dignity, you showed a just regard for the arduous labors, weighty responsibilities and exalted position of the presiding judge. That the same consideration will be accorded to Your Honor by those practising before you, we have no doubt.

It is our earnest hope that Your Honor may live long to occupy and adorn your important position; and by your able and impartial administration of justice sustain the attachment of our people for the law courts of this province.
