

A CONTRAST.

A Mexican-German Traveler Who Says "Canadians Don't Drink."

A German named Julio Sternan of Torreon, Mex., in conversation at the Queen's Hotel, Toronto, laughed at the idea of temperance societies in Canada the other day. "Why," said he, "the people don't drink liquor here; they are too stingy. Down in Mexico five pints of champagne for one makes a nice entertainment, and \$14 a bottle is often paid for some of our wines. Up here you never see the old Spanish sherry we have down there." Probably it was because Mr. Sternan was in the wholesale liquor business that the abstinence of the Canadian people so forcibly impressed him, says The Globe. At any rate, he was not particularly elated over it. He would have them spend their money as the Spaniards do in Mexico. "They will have the best," he said, "and they're willing to pay for it."

Mr. Sternan is to make a tour of Canada and Europe before returning to his home at Torreon. Signor Jose Maria Urutia, a wealthy cotton planter of the Laguna District, accompanies him. He could not speak English, so Mr. Sternan did the talking. He nodded towards his companion, and with a wry face said that the Spanish were hot against the English simply through jealousy. "That's the whole secret of it," he added, "jealousy. They know in their hearts that the English are in the right, but they're jealous." Asked as to his own sentiments, he whiffed his cigar, and then answered that the Boers hadn't treated English residents properly in the first place, and in the end didn't know when they were well off.

Cotton is the staple product of the Laguna District of Mexico. At the time Mr. Sternan left a drouth was on, but the last year's harvest had been a good one, about six times as great as four years ago. Mr. Sternan said that cotton cost on an average, all told, 12c a pound, and yielded a return last year of 26c a pound. "You should come down to Mexico," he concluded, "there's no money to be made up here."

GEOLOGY OF TORONTO.

Glacial Period Effects—Don Valley Contains the Evidences of the First, Second and Third Periods.

Prof. Coleman, of Toronto University, recently delivered a lecture on the geology of Toronto. His remarks were interesting, because of an almost total absence of technicalities, and instructive because of the information he detailed. Geological history, he said, resembled the history of a nation, because it has its mythical, ancient, medieval and modern stages. This region was at one time, as was the whole earth, a molten mass. When this cooled, granite rock was formed, and we see the evidences of this action to-day in the rocks of the Muskoka district. This granite formation, however, is 1,200 feet below the earth's surface on the site of the city. Following this, was the advent of animal life. Animals in this period, which corresponds to ancient history, had no backbone, were much like our present clams. Their fossils are still to be found in the Don valley. Professor Coleman then told of the climate and how it became much warmer. Immense animals, much like the elephant, having no covering of fur, roamed over the place where Toronto stands to-day. One that he described, walked on its hind legs and was over 15 feet high and over four feet across the body. These were the first warm-blooded animals, and their brains were more highly developed than any other preceding species. These animals, however, were exterminated by the first glacial period, or ice age, when the snow was nearly two miles in depth. Following this was the inter-glacial period when the snow entirely disappeared. It came back again, however, and this is known as the second glacial period. The evidences of this are to be found in the Don valley also. The first period was responsible for the underlying layer of clay, caused by the second glacial period. During the latter period, the rolling hills to the north of Toronto, on Yonge street, were formed by glacial action. Lake Ontario at one time extended northward to the hills behind Toronto, and at this point the shore line is higher than at Hamilton, and lower than that at Trenton. At that time, of course, they must have been of equal height, and the explanation is that the earth's surface has tipped upward towards the northeast. Prof. Coleman pointed out that should this action continue, Niagara Falls would eventually disappear. He also told of a time when the proposed canal between Lake Ontario and Georgian Bay would have been superfluous because the two bodies of water were joined by a neck of water, which flowed over the present site of Toronto.

The Maple Leaf Forever.

The Montreal Witness says that the true Canadian flag is seldom seen. It should contain the arms of Canada and nothing more. There should be no white spot, no wreath of flowers and leaves, no lion, no beaver, no crown, nothing but the Canadian arms. Strange to say, continued The Witness, on no flag and nowhere else is the true Canadian escutcheon ever seen. The escutcheon of Canada consists of the arms of the first four provinces, in the four quarters. This has never been altered by authority. Yet even on the lettered paper of the public departments and of the Premier's own office it has been departed from by the introduction of the so-called arms of all provinces. Not only is the escutcheon thus paraded not the appointed one, but, as constructed, it is heraldically an impossible escutcheon. This may be considered a very small matter in these days, when heraldry is looked upon as a mere child's play. But, by the way, grave institutions go suddenly into this child's play to arrogate bearing to themselves which were never granted them by the Herald's College. But no one can question that flags are important. Flags are necessarily matters of heraldry, and to convey true meanings should follow its rules. We shall be glad to see the day when the whole menagerie of our provincial arms shall be banished from our Canadian flag and replaced by a simple emblem which all men will recognize and understand as representing Canada.
