AN OMISSION.

Dr. Inch has called our attention to the fact that in our article yesterday regarding the call for New Brunswick teachers from South Africa, the name of one young lady was inadvertently omitted from the list of those whose services Mr. Sargent has especially requested shall be loaned him for assistance in his effort to establish an adequate school system, the Transvaal and Orange River colonies. Mr. Sargent in a communication to the chief superintendent of education requests that Dr. H. S. Bridges of St. John Principal Mullin, Miss Lilian Nicholson and Miss Clara Bridges of this city be permitted to go to South Africa to cooperate in his educational project, and Miss Nicholson's name was the one omitted from yesterday's list, through no fault of the Herald. Miss Nicholson is the efficient primary teacher in the York Street School, and a high educational authority has informed the Herald that she has no superior in her line of work in this province. Mr. Sargent during his stay in Fredericton last autumn twice visited Miss Nicholson's department closely observing the work there.

The publication of the call from South Africa in the Herald has attracted widespread attention from the teachers, and already all the application blanks which were sent to Dr. Inch by Mr. Sargent, have been exhausted, so that it will be useless for other teachers to apply until the Chief Superintendent has further communication from Mr. Sargent.

THE S. P. C. A.

Spasmodic efforts are made in Fredericton to interest the public in the work of the society for the prevention of cruelty to animals, but the organization does not receive that support which is due it as a humane institution. The membership is small, the finances are weak, conditions not at all creditable to a Christian community. There should be enough money in the treasury and sufficient energy in the membership to employ a regularly paid inspector to enforce the law for the protection of dumb animals. There is a wide field in this city for the exercise of the society's aims. One can scarcely walk along the public streets without witnessing the most outrageous treatment of dumb animals. Horses are treated scandalously by their drivers; this is especially true of some of the delivery teams and livery coaches, and it is time that the society or some one in authority stepped in and put the law in motion against the fiends who cruelly treat the dumb brutes entrusted to their care.

The President of the Society, Rev. Dean Partridge, has endeavored to stir up public interest both in his official position and in his pulpit, and we are informed that not long ago he made an effort to interest the public schools in the society's objects, proposing that the pupils should be permitted to hear addresses on the subject of cruelty to dumb animals and form bands of mercy for the education of the children. The proposition, strange to say, did not seem to arouse the interest of the Board and nothing came of it. However another effort will be made in that direction, it is hoped with better success.

QUEEN'S SQUARE.

If the late E. H. Wilmot were alive today he would be bound to feel that at least one of his gifts to the city is not much appreciated. We refer to Queen's Square, some acres of land in an attractive part of the city which Mr. Wilmot donated for the use of the public. The city

council which is the guardian of the trust, has made little effort to improve the Square, and its present condition is not flattering to the city. Two years ago after agitation by the Herald, the council was induced to make a driveway around the square, but the job was a rough one never completed and the road is now unfit for use. A couple of days work with the road machine would render the driveway passable for both carriages and bicycles, at a very moderate cost. The trees which formally decorated the square are nearly all dead or dying, and these should be replaced by new ones which in a few years would add much to the attractiveness of the spot.

It is a shame and a disgrace to the city that the square should be permitted to remain in its present condition, and we trust there is some member of the Council ready to move that the place be improved.

We beg to direct the attention of the Mayor and Aldermen to the square, and trust they will not let this season pass without doing something to improve its appearance and show public appreciation of the late Mr. Wilmot's splendid philanthropy.

The public call for a more searching investigation into the circumstances of Col. Hewitson's death than has yet been held, and will not be satisfied until the affair is probed to the bottom. The unfortunate man seems to have been cruelly neglected in a dive which is a disgrace to the city, and ought to be summarily closed up. Hewitson, according to the evidence at the inquest, was left in a cold room all Friday night without a bed or any opportunity of lying down, and without food, but was liberally supplied with liquor at his own cost. The evidence shows most revolting conditions.

Sir Wilfred Laurier announced in Parliament, Monday, that in compliance with the general wish of the Canadian people the 24th of May would be proclaimed a perpetual holiday, and on his motion Mr. Horsey's bill to this effect was transferred to government orders.

A Melbourne despatch says that the stmr. Ophir, bearing the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, has been sighted off Cape Leenwin, the most south western point of Australia.

Dr. C. A. Black of Baie Verte, who represented Westmorland in the legislature from 1882 to 1886, died at his home Monday, aged 64. He was a native of Sackville and a Conservative.

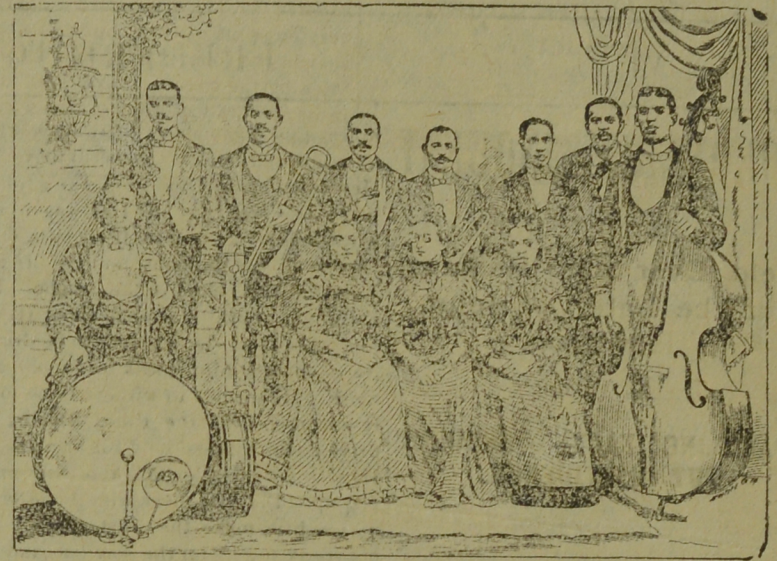

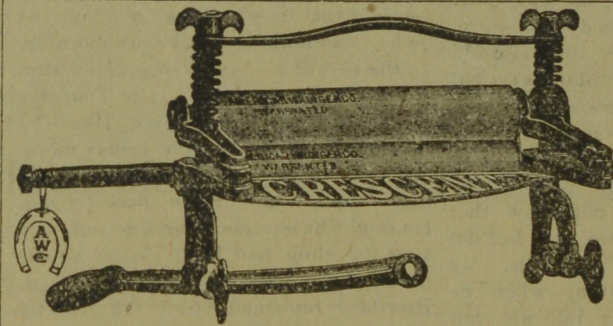
