It was quite painful at first, but he is gradually recovering the use of the injured limb.

MOVING DAY.

Some of the Changes Which the 1st of May is Bringing.

Tomorrow will be the great moving day of the year, but the indications are that the number of moves will be smaller than in former years. Mrs George Fraser, who at present occupies the half of the Edgcombe house above the central hose station, is to remove to Samuel Cook's house just below Cooper's factory on the same street. Thos H Colter is to remove from the Coburn house on King street to the Carvell house on Northumberland street, and the house vacated by him will be taken by Conn Alanson McNally of Queensbury. SERIOUS ACCIDENT.

A Four-Year-Old Boy Run Over on Westmorland Street.

An accident which may result fatally occurred on Westmorland street at three o'clock this afternoon. A four-year-old son of Newton Lee, was playing with a hoe in front of his home, and noticing a team standing in front of Palmer's tannery crossed over and struck the horse with the hoe. This caused the animal to start suddenly, with the result that the boy was knocked down and both wheels of the vehicle passed over his body. The little fellow was picked up unconscious and carried into the house and medical aid summoned.

The team frightened by the boy belongs to Mr. Palmer, and was loaded at the time with packing cases. The exact extent of the boy's injuries are not yet known, but it is thought he has a slim chance for recovery.

Today's Funerals.

The funeral of the late Charles Lee took place from the residence of W B Phair, at four o'clock this afternoon and was attended by many friends and relatives. The remains were conveyed to the Cathedral where an impressive service was conducted by Rev. Dean Partridge. Interment was made in the old burying ground, Brunswick street. The list of mourners included A C Lee, A C Fairweather, and S L Fairweather of St John, and Messrs W B and Byron Phair of this city.

The remains of the late Col John Hewitson were interred in Forest Hill cemetery this afternoon. Services were held in the Cathedral by Rev Dean Partridge at 2.30 o'clock. A number of friends and relatives followed the remains to their last resting place.
