Interesting Occurrences

FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

The Presbyterian mission committee at Toronto has received a message from Rev Dr. McClure in China, stating that the missionaries who recently started inland were having a peaceful journey and the official reception was unexceptional.

The first cable for a telephone line between Brussels and London has been laid. The distance is 250 miles, 56 of which will be under water. The cost of the construction of the line will be £36,000.

China is favorably considering a Russian offer to purchase the Pei Yang squadron, consisting of three fast cruisers, four torpedo boat destroyers and some third-class cruisers, the price, 5,000,000 roubles (\$2,575,000), to be deducted from the war indemnity.

An Order-in-Council has been passed at Ottawa providing that oysters shall not be fished for, caught, killed, bought, sold or had in possession on and from June 1, to September 22, both days inclusive. Previously the close season lasted from June 1 to September 15.

The marriage of Lady Sybil Primrose, daughter of Lord Roseberry, to the Earl of Beauchamp, which was to have taken place this autumn, will be postponed owing to the illness of the bride-elect. She is suffering from a mysterious skin disease, which may disfigure her face, and which she contracted from fondling a pet cat.

Sir A. P. Caron, K.C.M.G., K. C., has become associated with R. V. Sinclair, for the purpose of carrying on business at Ottawa as Parliamentary, Departmental, Supreme and Exchequer Courts agents. The firm will be known as "Caron and Sinclair." Sir A. P. Caron is an advocate and attorney of the province of Quebec, and Mr. Sinclair is a barrister and solicitor of the province of Ontario.

Some interesting facts appear from the late census of Germany. There are now 442 German cities with populations ranging between ten thousand and one hundred thousand. In 1816 Germany had 24,833,000 inhabitants; in 1855, 36,114,000, and now, by the last census, the inhabitants number 56,345,000. Prussia's population nearly tripled in the same time. In 1816 it was 13,709,000, and in 1900 34,463,000.

There was an innovation in the Methodist church service at Shelbourne street church, Toronto, Sunday. Male and female members of the choir appeared in black gowns like university professors, with white collars and ties. The women had no hats, but wore black velvet bows in the hair. The congregation is wealthy and the gowns are intended to put an end to any distinction in dress and prevent rivalry among the ladies. The congregation is highly pleased.

Mr. Hall Caine presided at a meeting in support of the orphan fund of the Institute of Journalists at Douglas, Isle of Man, and said that journalism was one of the great forces in human life. It was the pulpit of the people, and did more than anything else to break down the barriers dividing man from man and race from race. He added that the press was the greatest and truest Socialist in the world. It contributed more than any other agency towards the practical recognition of the brotherhood of man.

The Ottawa authorities are beginning to wake up to the seriousness of the smallpox outbreak. Dr. Law has been appointed assistant to the local health officer. Dr. Robillard, and orders have gone out for the compulsory vaccination of all school children. Mr. W. J. Anderson, local Manager of the Bank of Montreal, has issued an order that all clerks in the branch be vaccinated immediately. The lady employees at the Census Bureau were vaccinated Friday. One of them fainted, and the men very ungallantly indulged in a lot of chuckling over it. Next morning the men were vaccinated, and no less than four of them toppled over.

The new offices of the Canadian Pacific Railway in Trafalgar Square, London, are to be very imposing. Sir Thomas

Shanghnessy says that the great feature would be the top story, which would be so arranged as to give night panoramas of Canadian scenery. The building would have a free stone front and would probably be a replica of the C. P. R. telegraph building on St. Francis Xavier street. The building will be on the south side of the square, formerly occupied by three large shops, and will face the National Gallery across the square. The Daily Chronicle, speaking of the general plan, says that it is evident that the new structure will add an imposing feature to Trafalgar square, and be quite in keeping with the fine premises of the Union Bank of London and the Sun Life Office, which will flank it on either side.

FOUND KEG OF GOLD.

John A. Shaw Strikes it
Rich in South Africa.

WHITMAN FORMER BUSINESS
MAN LEFT TOWN WITH
AFFAIRS UNSETTLED.

Writes Old Partner He Will
Come Home and Square
Up Accounts.

Whitman, Mass., Sept. 30.—News has been received from John A. Shaw, who was formerly engaged in business here and who left town with affairs in a rather unsettled condition. One morning a few months ago the store occupied by Mr. Shaw on the corner of Stetson street and South avenue was discovered vacant and the proprietor missing. The creditors took possession. In a few days the Globe correspondent received word from Mr. Shaw stating that he was going to commit suicide.

A few months later it was learned that Mr. Shaw had reached South Africa. He wrote his former business partner, Manley Thomas, and the pages were liberally punctuated with tears. He hoped that the time would come when he could send diamonds home. He said that he had met a rich Englishman who assisted him in South Africa. He stated that he was starting for a rather wild country, and had had many hair-breadth escapes. He had killed many men in battle, and had been left for dead.

Another letter was received yesterday by Thomas, in which Shaw tells of strange encounters and some rather unusual incidents which at least have made him a rich man. One day, Shaw says, in company with two companions on a rambling expedition, they came across an old shanty. They noticed that in one corner the earth looked as if it had been dug up and they investigated. They found a keg of gold, and it was about all that they could do to handle it. It was thought that the gold was left there by some men who were killed in battle.

Shaw and his companions advertised for the owners, but they were not found, and they took the property. He writes that his share was \$2,000, and with this money he purchased an interest in a gold mine there. The result was very satisfactory, according to the letter, for Mr. Shaw has made all sorts of money. He writes Mr. Thomas that he has all the money he needs, and he proposes to return to Whitman, meet his creditors, settle his bills and live quietly.

Mr. Thomas has notified several of the creditors of Mr. Shaw's intentions, and they propose to tender him a reception on his return.

LINCOLN'S BODY

Is Buried Where Robbers Cannot Get It.

Springfield, Ill., Sept. 28.—The burial of the remains of Abraham Lincoln has practically been completed. Half a dozen workmen were occupied all day yesterday in cementing over the cage in which the coffin was placed Thursday, in the vault at the base of the monument shaft.

Over six feet of cement had been laid over the coffin when work was suspended last night. The remainder will be laid today, and then the tile flooring of the tomb will be laid. The marble sarcophagus originally intended for the reception of the body will be replaced in its old position in the tomb early next week.

It is thought now that no further removal of the body will ever be made. The coffin is buried 13 feet in the ground beneath the tomb containing the crypts, where lie the remainder of the family. On a cement base four feet thick rests the iron cage inclosing the coffin. Above the cage will be eight feet of solid masonry. It would take a large force of workmen several days to exhume the coffin, under the most favorable circumstances.

WILL KITCHENER RESIGN?

Westminster Gazette Says he
Thinks of it.

MARTIAL LAW IN CAPE TOWN THE
ISSUE.

The Cape Government Opposed to Its Ex-
tension Says the Daily Mail
[Correspondent.

London, Sept. 30.—The Pall Mall Gazette this afternoon confirms the rumor published by the Daily Mail to-day of difference between Lord Kitchener and War Secretary Brodrick, and adds that as a result Mr. Brodrick has had a long interview with the King. The Pall Mall Gazette declares it is in a position to say that Lord Kitchener is dissatisfied with the partial enforcement of martial law in South Africa, wanting it proclaimed at Cape Town and elsewhere. He also desires more serious penalties for rebellion and better reinforcements. Lord Kitchener took over the command with the explicit understanding that his hands were not to be tied, but as this condition was not carried out, "he is seriously reconsidering his position."

In a letter from Cape Town, dated Aug. 28, The Daily Mail's correspondent states that at that time the question of extending martial law to the whole peninsula was an issue between the colonial Cabinet who opposed it and Lord Kitchener, supported by the Governor of the colony, Sir Walter Hely-Hutchinson. The correspondent says:—

"The colonial Cabinet are to a man diametrically opposed to the extension of the rule of the sword to the capital, and the Cabinet are being backed up by the whole community, except a few fanatics whose one idea of martial law is that it would enable the military to lay by the heels half a dozen rank rebels who infest the streets of the city. I gather that under no circumstances will the Ministry consent to abrogate civil law in this part of the country, and that rather than be party to such procedure they will force a crisis of the most serious character. Colonial experience of the administration of martial law in many parts of the colony has been such as to make responsible men look with alarm upon any proposal to extend the system to Cape Town. I am but stating the views of many men of high standing and authority in the colony, men whose loyalty is not to be questioned, when I declare that the action of certain of the officers charged with the administration of the rule of the sword is severely straining, to use a mild term, the loyalty of very many people in the country districts. We learn, for example, of a Dutch reformed minister and his church elders being hauled before a commandant and fined £3 each for permitting two young people to be married in their church without his (the commandant's) permission."
