TOMORROW'S ELECTION.

Polling will take place tomorrow in the Nova Scotia general local election, and the contest attracts considerable attention all over Canada. There does not seem much doubt as to the result, however, it being the universal belief that the Murray Liberal government will be sustained by an overwhelming majority.

The Nova Scotia House consists of thirty-eight members, each of the eighteen counties electing two representatives excepting Pictou and Halifax, which elect three each. On nomination day four Liberals were elected by acclamation in Yarmouth and Antigonish, and in Salsburne there is only one opposition candidate for two seats, so that practically there will be only thirty-three seats at issue in tomorrow's voting.

The members of the government are seeking re-election as follows: Premier Murray in Victoria, Attorney General Longley in Annapolis, Chief Commissioner Drysdale in Hants, Hon. T. R. Black in Cumberland, Hon. David Macpherson in Halifax, Hon. Thos. Johnson in Shelburne and Hon. A. B. Comeau in Digby. Only the three first named hold portfolios. Hon. A. McGillivray, the other member of the government, has his seat by acclamation in Antigonish.

The friends of the government feel quite confident of carrying all the counties except Colchester, Hants, Lunenburg and Pictou. These with the exception of Hants, returned Conservatives to Ottawa in the last general election, that party is well organized in all four, and expect to at least split the representation in the legislature. Neither Colchester nor Pictou since confederation has returned a straight Liberal delegation to the legislature, except on one occasion in Colchester. In the last House, Colchester sent one Liberal and one Conservative, Pictou two Liberals, and one Conservative, and Hants one each, while the Liberal minister Church had a majority of only two in Lunenburg. These facts render all four counties doubtful constituencies, and the chief interest of the campaign centers in them. The Herald's advice is that in Colchester, Mr. Pearson Liberal will probably be elected, and his colleague may also pull through, although Conservatives claim that the latter has rather a doubtful show. In Pictou it is expected that E. M. MacDonald a gentleman well known in Fredericton, will be elected, with possibly one of his two colleagues, but both Colchester and Pictou may well be placed in the doubtful column until the returns are in.

The most prominent opposition men seeking election are Hon. Daniel McNeil, in Inverness, John A. MacDonald, ex-M. P., in Victoria, Mr. Wilcox in Hants, Mr. Stairs in Colchester, Mr. Stewart, editor of the Herald in Halifax, Mr. Tanner in Pictou and Mr. Smith in Cumberland. Mr. Wilcox was the opposition leader in the last house, but both Mr. Stairs and Mr. Tanner if elected, will be claimants for the position, with the chances in favor of the former.

The Murray government is appealing to the people on an excellent record, and deserves to be well sustained at the polls.

SIR THOMAS LIPTON.

The titled sportsman, who for a second time has built a yacht to lift the America cup, is a unique character in his way, and a true sportsman. Starting life as an errand boy in the old country, he soon tired of his modest prospects and sought his fortune in the United States, where

he somewhat bettered his condition, but not until his return home a few years later, did he commence to achieve the phenomenal success that has made his name a household word throughout the world. He started a grocery and provision store on a small scale, and his business has expanded until he has branches in all the important cities and towns of the United Kingdom, and is many times a millionaire.

Sir Thomas has become noted for his philanthropy as well as his wealth and sporting proclivities, and in the jubilee year 1887 he contributed \$125,000 to a charitable scheme which has led by the Princess of Wales. Knighthood soon followed that very liberal donation.

Sir Thomas Lipton, who is unmarried, lives at Osidge, a pleasant, rambling, old-fashioned house, standing in a well-wooded park, near Southgate, Middlesex. The house is comparatively modern, boasting an antiquity of only about a hundred years. The gardens and grounds are delightful, and in the park Sir Thomas has a well laid out golf course, over which he amuses himself with his friend occasionally. There is nothing pretentious about the house, which is designed for comfort and convenience, and not as a show place for the eyes of strangers. Sir Thomas Lipton shares with Mr. Chamberlain a taste for orchids, and in his houses are to be found many splendid examples of these exotics. Smooth lawns, gay beds of flowers, and fine old cedars and pollard oaks, add not a little to the charm of the ground. From the windows of this typical English home a fine prospect meets the eye. In the foreground lies a pleasant, undulating country, while far away stretches the gigantic wren of London, with its pall of smoke. On a clear day the gilded cross of St. Paul's Cathedral can be descried shimmering in the sunlight.

Sir Thomas is recognized as one of the squarest sports who ever owned a yacht, and his popularity both at home and in the United States is very great. He has invested millions in the attempt to carry back the America cup to England, and his pluck and energy deserve success.

"Wherever he has gone" writes Douglas Story in the New York Herald, "the Duke of York has impressed the people with his shrewd common sense, with his knowledge of affairs, and with the strength of his personality. His speeches are no mere recitations of a colorless official secretary's words. They are definite and statesmanlike, and the Duke in delivering them leaves no doubt of his convictions upon the minds of his hearers. Those people who have had only the vapourings of society newspapers upon which to found an estimate of their future King, have not known him till he came among them."

The despatches told of the Duke and Duchess at a point in the Rocky mountains disembarking from their train and taking a run in the woods disporting themselves like children. No doubt their Royal Highnesses were pleased to be relieved from the surroundings and embarrassments of officialdom which seems to have taken complete possession of them since they arrived in Canada.
