Historic Building Must Go.

The Sheffield, Eng., Week and Weekly News, has the following item which will interest many Canadians who have visited the spot referred to.

"A building intimately associated with John Wesley is about to disappear. It was on Trinity Sunday, 1743, that the famous preacher began his ministry at the Chapel in West street, Seven Dials. Speaking of that occasion Wesley writes: 'I was a little afraid at first that my strength would not suffice for the business of the day when a service of five hours (for it lasted from ten to three) was added to my usual employment.' Here it was that Wesley and Whitefield celebrated their reconciliation, and here, too, the saintly Fletcher, of Madeley, preached his first sermon in 1751. The first floor of the adjoining vestry house formed a Nicodem room, where, with windows opening into the chapel, the celebrities of the day could hear without being seen. This house is now condemned, and ordered to be pulled down forthwith. It is at present in the occupation of the Seven Dials Mission, and it is proposed to build upon its site a new building, where the urgently-needed increase of space for the work may be obtained."

Big Price for Old Portrait.

The most valuable picture that has been offered to the London public this season was sold the other day at Willis' rooms by Messrs. Robinson & Fisher. It was Hoppner's three-quarter length portrait of Lady Louisa Manners, who was afterwards Countess of Dysart.

The work is familiar in its engraved form, and the picture was once of the treasures of 24 Carlton House terrace. It was sold by order of the executor of the late Lady Charles Bruce, and formerly was the property of Lady Laura Toller-mache, afterward Maria Marchioness of Ailesbury.

The bidding started at 5,000 guineas. Messrs. Duveen Brothers and Charles Wertheimer being the leading bidders, and was taken to 14,050 guineas, at which price it was knocked down to Duveen.

A Queen Victoria Bible

The Bible used at the marriage service of the late Queen Victoria and Prince Albert was offered for sale by public auction at Thornby Rectory, Northamptonshire, recently, at the disposal of the effects of the rector, the Rev. John Coucman. The Bible was given by Queen Victoria to the Rev. John Sleath, at one time sub-dan of the Chapels Royal, and its authenticity was abundantly verified. Starting at a sovereign, the bidding rapidly rose to 40 guineas, which sum the Bible was sold to Mr. C. Wilson of Northampton. The intrinsic value of the volume was about 10s.

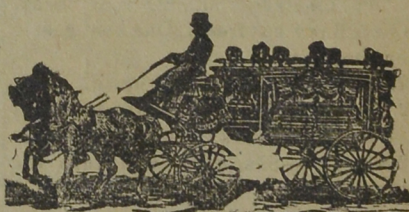

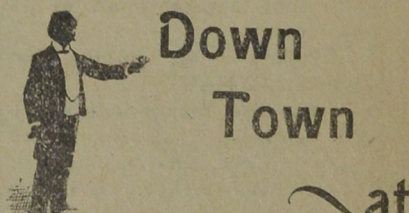
