

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE ORDER

Is Given for Valor in War—Capt. A. H. Macdonnell's Decoration.

The Distinguished Service Order, to which several young Canadian officers have recently been gazetted, including Captain Archie H. Macdonnell, formerly of the R. C. R. I., Fredericton, is pre-eminently a young man's decoration. The Bath is for senior officers who have conducted themselves well in the higher work of a campaign, and the D. S. O. has been instituted for the junior, on whom the rough work and the actual fighting falls. "Her Majesty," in formal official language, "having taken into consideration that the means of adequately rewarding the distinguished services of officers in the naval and military services who had been honorably mentioned in despatches were limited, instituted and created for the purpose of rewarding individual instances of meritorious and distinguished service in war a new naval and military order of distinction." The badge consists of a gold cross, enamelled white, edged with gold, having on the one side in the centre, within a wreath of laurel enamelled green, the Imperial crown in gold, upon a red enamelled ground, and on the reverse, within a similar wreath, and on a similar red ground, the Imperial and Royal cypher, V.R.I. It is to be suspended from the left breast by a red ribbon, edged blue, one inch wide. The order takes precedence next after the Order of the Indian Empire, which in its turn comes after the Order of the Indian Empire, which in its turn comes after the Order of St. Michael and St. George. Awarded, as it is, for personal valor, energy or judgment, it is very highly prized in the navy and army.

LONG-LOST SWORD FOUND.

Lieut. Cadwallader Dropped the Weapon While Rescuing Companion on Battlefield.

A sword lost on a battle-field of the war of the American rebellion, 37 years ago, after figuring in a series of interesting incidents, has just been returned to its owner, Col. C. N. Cadwallader, of 4118 Girard av., Philadelphia.

The sword was presented to Col. Cadwallader when he entered the army as a lieutenant of battery G., 2nd heavy artillery, also known as the 112th Pennsylvania volunteers. On the blade was the inscription:

"Lieut. C. N. Cadwallader, From His Philadelphia Friends."

Owing to the dimness of the inscription and the fact that it was on the back of the blade instead of on one of the sides, the young officer did not discover it until several weeks afterward.

Lieut. Cadwallader was soon promoted to the rank of captain, and later was brevetted major and lieutenant colonel for gallantry on the field. He wore the sword until the battle of Chapin's farm, on Sept. 20, 1864. On this occasion, while serving on the staff on Gen. Fairchild, he was aiding Capt. Nicholas Bages, who, severely wounded, was in danger of falling into the hands of the enemy.

While so employed Capt. Cadwallader's sword belt was broken, and as the weapon encumbered his movements he threw it away. For 37 years he did not see it again.

A few days ago Col. Cadwallader received a letter from Commander J. J. Castle, of S. Y. Post 45 Lee Center, Oneida county, N. Y. This letter informed him that a sword inscribed with his name had lain for 25 years on the post altar in Lee Center, and that its inscription had just been discovered.

Col. Cadwallader at once established his claim to the weapon, and it was forwarded to him with the information that it had been picked up on the field of Chapin's farm by Corp. O. M. Potter of battery H 3rd New York artillery. After retaining it for several years, he gave it to Starr post, which had treasured it as the blade of a confederate officer who had fallen in the engagement.

REMOVING TO CALIFORNIA.

C. H. Clarke, a Prominent St. Stephen Citizen Closing up Business.

(St. Andrews Beacon)

After being in business in St. Stephen for 32 years, Mr. Chas. H. Clarke, on Thursday, sold out all his extensive commercial interests in that place to Mr. W. C. Purvis, of St. John. It is understood that the purchase was made for Mr. Purvis' son and Mr. Walter Graham, who will be associated together. Mr. Clarke, who is a native of St. John, began life in St. Stephen as book-keeper for the late C. B. Eaton. Shortly afterwards he went into business on his own account. For a time the firm's name was Vaughan & Clarke. By industry and foresight he succeeded in developing one of the largest business enterprises in the province. Mr. Clarke took an active interest in politics and as a political organizer he had few equals. Being a public spirited citizen, he was ever among the first to lend his assistance to any scheme that would benefit the town. The public showed their confidence in him by electing him mayor of St. Stephen, and it is said to his credit that the business of the place was never better administered than during Mr. Clarke's term of office. He will be missed as a citizen. Mr. Clarke told The Beacon that when he wound up his affairs he would likely remove to Southern California with his daughter and her husband.

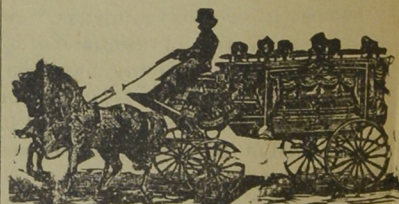
