AUSPICIOUS OPENING.

Splendid weather prevailed to-day, and the provincial exhibition was opened under most favorable circumstances. Even at this early date the attendance was very satisfactory. A pleasing feature of to-day's programme was the address to the Lieut Governor from the exhibition managers and His Honor's very interesting reply.

All the departments of the big show are in shape, and running smoothly, and the quantity, and character of the exhibits attract great attention. The amusement features too promise a great success, and indeed almost everybody's taste can be satisfied by a visit to the buildings and grounds.

THE WAR IS OVER.

Some hot stuff was served up at the city council meeting last night, ending in a resolution to evict the city clerk from his back office. The whole affair shows what a large quantity of wind the present council can expend over a very small matter. The Mayor is certainly entitled to an office in the civic building, all his predecessors have had such accommodation, but the effort to provide His Worship with the required room, has given rise to a lot of heart burnings. Probably the trouble is over now, the city clerk will have to submit, and it may be possible for him to transact both his public and private business in his front office cut in two.

The citizens will be grateful that the affair has passed without bloodshed, and with only the average expenditure of oratory, for which the present council has become quite celebrated.

The royal yacht Ophir, in which the Duke of York is making his tour of the world, was originally one of the Orient line of steamers running between England and Australia, and had earned a great reputation in shipping circles for her comfort, speed and safety. She is 482 feet long with a beam of 53 ft 6 in, registers 6,910 tons, her engines are 10,000 power and her speed 18 knots per hour. She is as safe as human experience, skill and ingenuity could make her, and is divided by watertight bulkheads as to float in safety with any two compartments thrown open to the sea.

The remains of the late President McKinley reached the White House at Washington yesterday from Buffalo, and all along the route there were indications of the sincere mourning of the people at his violent death. The body was allowed to repose at the official residence to-day, and this evening will be taken to Canton, Ohio, where interment will take place on Thursday. Mrs. McKinley is standing the awful strain with true courage, but her friends fear that a physical breakdown will occur when she fully realizes her great loss.

Czolgosz the assassin of President McKinley was arraigned in court at Buffalo yesterday, and indicted for murder in the first degree. When asked if he had engaged counsel he refused to open his mouth, and two eminent lawyers were appointed to conduct his defence.

PROVINCIAL S. S. CONVENTION.

Committees Appointed to Make all Arrangements—Parish Conventions.

The Provincial Sunday School Association will hold its annual convention in this city on Oct. 8, 9, 10. The meetings will be held in the Methodist church.

A meeting of the general committee of management for local arrangements, consisting of representatives from the city schools and those of St Marys and Gibson met in the Y M C A parlor last evening and appointed the committees necessary for the coming convention.

Between 200 and 250 delegates are expected.

The county executive, at the close of the meeting, arranged for the following parish conventions:

Kingsclear, Sept 25; Canterbury, Sept 25; McAdam, Sept 26; Manners-Sutton, to be held at Harvey Station, Sept 27; Stanley, Sept 30; St Marys, Oct 1; Douglas and Bright to be held at the Mouth of Keswick, Oct 2.

FIRE AT NASHWAAKSIS.

Three Barns Belonging to Geo L Pugh Burned to the Ground.

Geo. L Pugh, an enterprising farmer of Nashwaaksis, suffered the loss of his three barns by fire this forenoon. The flames were discovered about ten o'clock, and fanned by a strong northwesterly wind, they made rapid progress and in a remarkably short space of time all three buildings were consumed. The dwelling house, located some distance from the barns, was saved, and the hog pen also escaped destruction.

All the season's crop of hay and grain, stored in the barns, went up in smoke, as also did a quantity of farm implements. A horse in one of the barns when the fire broke out, was got out in safety.

The supposition is that the fire was set by small boys, who had been playing about the barns with matches. One of the barns was entirely new and was unusually large in size.

Great sympathy will be felt for Mr. Pugh over his loss, which will not be less than \$2,500. It is understood that he carried only \$200 insurance.
