

Splendid Military Spectacle.

Duke of York Reviewed 4,000
Troops on the Historic Plains
of Abraham

And Presented Medals to South African Heroes.

GAVE CANADA GREAT CREDIT FOR HER SHARE IN THE
SOUTH AFRICAN WAR.

Eloquent Utterance in Reply to the Civic Address.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Quebec, Sept. 17.—The military review of 4,000 volunteers took place this morning before Their Royal Highnesses on the Plains of Abraham, under unfavorable weather conditions.

It was a success, however, and of more than passing interest as it marked the handing over to Quebec city as a public park forever, the historic plains where Wolfe and Montcalm settled by an engaged battle the destiny of New France.

The troops which took part before their future King, were composed in about equal proportions, French and English.

All Quebec turned out to see the review despite the rain, and large as the Plains are, it was difficult to keep the crowds from encroaching.

Several members of the royal party commented on the present happy relations of the two people when the descendants of those who fought on these Plains were able to parade shoulder to shoulder and to camp together in unity.

The parade was formed up at the appointed hour facing the St. Louis road with drawn swords and fixed bayonets.

Intervals of twelve paces were left between the cavalry and field artillery and within the space between brigades the regimental bands were massed six paces to the rear of their respective brigades and the fronting companies were between twenty and twenty four feet apart.

Major General O'Grady-Haly, C. B. D. S. O., was in command and on his staff were: Lieut. Col. the Hon. Mathew Aylmer, adjutant general, second in command; Col. J. H. L. Neilson, Quartermaster General; Lt. Col. Vidal, D. O. G.; Lt. Col. Lindsay; Lt. Col. Vine, Capt. D. Lafferty.

As soon as the inspection was over, the march past took place which was excellently executed. The troops then formed in review order for the presentation of medals.

The Duke and his staff arrived punctually and the general called royal salute which was given after which arms were presented colors towed, and the massed bands struck up "God save the King." The parade then coming to the shoulder of His Royal Highness proceeded to inspect the troops while the bands played marches.

The first decoration conferred was the Victoria cross on Lt. Col. Turner of Quebec for distinguished bravery in South Africa.

South African medals were then presented according to the program, presentations being constantly marked by cheers from the crowds. The troops then marched to their quarters and the Plains of Abraham passed into the hands of the city.

Quebec, Sept. 17.—At 9.30 yesterday morning the royal yacht Ophir rounded Levis Point, and as her white prow showed past the point a plume of smoke shot out from the citadel which crowns Cape Diamond and the report boomed over the water. Then the big guns boomed out, and as the Crescent spoke other boats joined in the roaring chorus. The French cruiser Destice was wreathed in smoke, from which flashes of flame joined and sharp reports were heard. The full twenty-one gun tribute to the royal party was paid by five cruisers and the fortress. When the smoke of firing had lifted it was seen that the sailors had been busy on board, for the ships from stem to stern were draped with flags. Then there was a flutter on the escorting cruisers, and in an instant they, too, were alive with shaking bunting. The crews of the cruisers stood to quarters, and on every deck there was a dark blue mass, relieved here and there by the scarlet of the marines. The scene as the five boats swept on to the anchorage off the citadel was a brilliant one. The only touch of sadness which marred the spectacle was

the appearance of the Stars and Stripes on each of the boats, the royal yacht included, suspended at half-mast, in token of the sorrow shared by other nations for the United States in that country's bereavement. In the most business-like fashion the royal yacht and the cruisers took the stations assigned them, and at half-past ten a salute of fourteen guns from the ships and the shore announced that Lord Minto was on his way to carry Canada's greetings to the Duke.

At 11.45 the governor general landed, and at 12.30 fresh salutes of 21 guns announced that the Duke and Duchess were landing. They came ashore in their launch with their suite, landing on the special pontoon at King's wharf, where guards of honor from H. M. S. Crescent had been drawn up to receive them.

Having ascended the gangway leading from the pontoon to the wharf the route of the royal party lay over a carpeted board walk across the wharf to the street entrance, where carriages awaited them. This pathway, which was covered like the pontoon and the gangway in maroon colored cloth, was lined with men from the fleet. The portion of the wharf need for the official landing was comparatively small, being that immediately in rear of the office of the marine and fisheries department and was carefully fenced in on both sides.

As soon as their Royal Highnesses had entered their carriages the royal procession got under way for Parliament House. Three mounted police led the way, followed at intervals of twenty-five yards by the advance guard of the escort, consisting of three troopers and one sergeant, the sergeant riding fifty yards behind the men. A space of fifty yards then intervened, after which came the staff officer, riding at the head of No. 1 troop, which was commanded by Lieut. Scott. A fifty yards' interval again occurred, followed by the carriages of the royal suite.

The carriages were followed by No. 2 troop of the fort. Then intervened the usual space of fifty yards, followed by the staff officers and the headquarters staff of the Canadian militia, headed by the general commanding, Major General O'Grady-Haly, Col. Aylmer, Col. Cotton, Lt. Col. Vidal, Lt. Col. Rutherford and Lt. Col. Howard. The headquarters staff was separated from the royal carriage which followed, by a space of fifty yards.

All the carriages in the procession were sent out from England and are marvels of luxury. That occupied by their Royal Highnesses is a road landau, and was drawn by six horses with out riders. Its color is dark sepia, artistically striped in crimson, and the upholstery is in royal blue cloth, with silk and satin trimmings. Upon the doors are the royal arms in gold. The wheels of the carriage are fitted with rubber tires. The gold-plated harness was in keeping with the general magnificence of the whole turnout, and the entire equipage naturally attracted much comment. In the same carriage with their Royal Highnesses rode Lord Wenlock, lord-in-waiting and head of the household.

Capt. Viscount Orichton rode on the right of the carriage, with Lt. Col. R. E. W. Turner, V. C., D. S. O., the officer commanding the escort, which was furnished by the Queen's Own Canadian Hussars, a bright and soldierly looking body of men. Lt. Col. Turner was attended by a trumpeter. On the left of the carriage rode Lt. Duke of Roxburghe of the Royal Horse Guards, and Major A. F. Aebmead, the officer second in command of the escort. The bright uniforms of the Horse Guards worn by the A. D. C.'s, contributed materially to the spectacular character of the procession.

No. 3 troop of the escort followed the royal carriages, Lt. Gooday commanding. After the next interval of fifty yards came No. 4 troop, under command of Lt.
