George's False Teeth.

The Baltimore Dental college, the oldest dental college in the world, has in its possession one of the most interesting relics of George Washington. This relic is a set of artificial teeth made by Dr. Greenwood, a dentist who was also an officer in the Continental army. The teeth were worn for some time by General Washington. Dr. Greenwood afterward made the general a second set, which he wore until his death and which was buried with him. The first set was afterward presented to the dental college by Dr. Greenwood. As much as \$5,000 has been offered for this set of teeth, but the faculty of the college refused the offer.

Toronto to Hamilton.

A Toronto man has received notice from the city of Hamilton that unless he goes up and cuts any weeds growing on the street on which he owns property he will render himself liable to a fine of \$20. 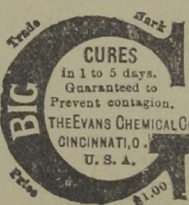
