SATISFACTORY REPORT FROM
BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

Company's Goods Enjoy a High
Reputation.

LAST YEAR'S OUTPUT EXCEEDED
\$200,000

An Industry of Which Fredericton Has
Reason to be Proud.

The annual general meeting of the stockholders of the Hartt Boot & Shoe Company, Limited, was held at the Company's office, in this city, on Saturday afternoon. The list of gentlemen present included

Arscott & Co., of Benton, and John Kilburn were represented by proxy.

The report of the directors showed that the last year's operations of the company had resulted in a small profit, not sufficient however, to liquidate the loss on the operations of the first year, therefore no dividend could be recommended. Since the company began operations in August 1899, over 200,000 pairs of shoes have been made, \$73,414.48 has been paid out in wages, and as many as 180 hands have been employed at one time. The report also claimed that the company had established for itself a very creditable reputation among the manufacturers of Canada for first class work, and as evidence of this, out of the shipments this spring, amounting to over \$100,000, less than \$500 worth of goods had been returned, and in most cases not because of any defect in the goods, but for the reason that the customer had ordered too heavily in certain lines.

The want of sufficient capital was, in the directors' opinion, the only drawback to the success of the Company, and the directors were given enlarged powers to borrow what funds might be necessary to carry on the transactions of the concern.

Messrs J D Phinney and C A Sampson, audit committee for the shareholders, reported that they had appointed Mr A S Murray to audit the books and accounts and that his report was as follows:

Mr Shaw went into the financial statement submitted and asked several questions which drew forth answers that seemed quite satisfactory to the meeting.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered to the directors for their services in the company's behalf. The meeting was harmonious throughout, and those who attended were well satisfied with the result of the company's operations as shown by the report.

The output of the company for the past year was \$203,000.
