Damage by Frost.

A heavy frost during Saturday night did considerable damage to the crops throughout the parishes of Kingsclear, Prince William and Douglas. Frost also did great damage the same night along the Valley of the Nashwaak. Potato and root crops on many farms are practically destroyed.

Beulah Camp Meeting.

The Reformed Baptists are to open their camp meeting at Brown's flats June 25 continuing to July 15, and among the workers present will be Rev Dr Levy of Philadelphia, Deacon Geo M Morse of Putnam, Conn, and Rev W H Hoople of New York. Special rates have been arranged on the steamers and rates for board are \$5.50 per day or \$2.50 per week.

Welcomed by Parishioners.

The members of the congregation of St. Thomas' Episcopal church, Wamsuck, R. I., recently tendered a reception to the rector, Rev. F. F. Flewelling and his bride. Rev. Mr. Flewelling, who is a native of Kings, was recently married at St. John, to Miss Mabel Smith niece of Postmaster Hilyard. He was presented with a substantial gift by his parishioners.

Woodford Ketchum's Loss.

On Wednesday the large farm buildings owned by Woodford Ketchum, formerly of Woodstock, and situated about two and one-half miles from Houlton, were totally destroyed by fire. The barn contained a large amount of hay, grain and valuable farming implements at the time and everything was entirely consumed. The loss is about \$2000 with an insurance of \$600. The cause of the fire is unknown.

A Pleasant Camp.

Mr and Mrs W P Flewelling moved to their new summer camp on the Kingsclear road Saturday, and are very pleasantly settled for the summer. The location is exceedingly attractive and the camp itself combines beauty and convenience. It is situated on a bluff commanding a fine view of the river, within ten minutes drive of the city, and Mr and Mrs Flewelling are anticipating a pleasant season in their new home. A telephone has been installed and the camp throughout is a model of comfort, and was erected by Harry M. Clarke from plans drawn by Mr Flewelling. It has been christened Old Orchard.

A GREAT SUCCESS.

Mrs. Melanson Gets the Sealskin Sacque.

A Moncton despatch says that the summer carnival in aid of the hospital building fund there proved a success in every way. The amount realized will exceed \$2,000, which, with subscriptions previously received and others promised, ensures the erection of the new building, probably next summer. About \$8,000 is required for the purposes of erection and equipment. The voting for the most popular local member for the county resulted in a large majority for Mr Melanson. He received 4,073 votes, against 1,490 for Mr Copp of Sackville, and 827 and 735 for Messrs Humphrey and Robinson respectively. The conservatives

practically united for Mr Melanson. Mrs Melanson becomes possessor of the \$253 sealskin sacque donated by Dunlop, Cook & Co. of Amherst.

DEATH OF D. B. BARKER.

Well Known Fredericton Man Passes Away at St John.

David B. Barker, of this city, who was admitted to the Home for Incurables at St John, a few weeks ago, suffering from cancer, died at that institution on Saturday. The deceased gentleman was 73 years of age and a bachelor. He was a member of an old respected loyalist family and was a near relative of Spafford Barker, an old time merchant of this city and founder of the Barker House. For many years the late Mr Barker held the office of assistant assessor here, retiring only a short time ago on account of ill-health. He was an honorable and upright citizen and was respected by all who knew him.

The remains arrived from St John this afternoon by the steamer David Weston and were interred in the old burying ground, Brunswick street. The services at the grave were conducted by Rev G M Campbell. John G Adams was funeral director.

A Convenient Change.

Hitherto the mails from points in New Brunswick, north of Woodstock, destined for Fredericton, were carried daily over the C. P. R., via McAdam, and did not arrive here until the day following, but today a change was made in the arrangements which will be more satisfactory to our business men having relations with the up river country. The mails are now put on board the Gibson branch train at Newburg Junction, reach here at 9 o'clock the same evening, and are distributed so that business men may get the letters the first thing in the morning if they desire to do so, instead of waiting until after the St. John mail is sorted as formerly.

Death of Mrs. Rutherford.

Mrs. Elizabeth Rutherford, widow of the late Squire John Rutherford of Tweedside, died at her home there on Saturday. She has not enjoyed good health for some years past, and lately has been quite infirm. Her maiden name was Wightman and she came from the north of England among the first settlers of Harvey over sixty years ago, when a small child. She was very highly esteemed by a large circle of friends. She is survived by three sons and two daughters.

Kilburn's Drive.

W J Nobles, the well known lumberman, who returned on Saturday from a trip to the Upper St John, reports that John Kilburn succeeded in moving his lumber drive a distance of about eight miles, before the water began to fall. He thinks that with a larger force of men he might have moved it twenty miles, but it seems hardly likely that he can reach the corporation limits under the circumstances. The drive was stranded in the first place about sixty miles above the upper corporation limits.

DIED IN MONTREAL.

William D. Richards, of Boiestown, Succumbs to His Illness.

WAS UNDERGOING TREATMENT AT THE ROYAL VICTORIA HOSPITAL.

Bright's Disease the Cause of His Demise.

WAS A PROMINENT LUMBERMAN AND RESPECTED BY ALL WHO KNEW HIM.

The sad news reached Boiestown on Sunday, that William D. Richards, secretary of the William Richards lumber company of that place, who had been undergoing treatment at the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal, for an internal malady, had succumbed to his illness on Saturday evening. Mr Richards had been a sufferer for some time from what was thought to be Bright's disease, and early in May left home in company with Mrs Richards on an extended trip to the West for the benefit of his health and also with the object of consulting a famous Montreal specialist. It was their intention to visit the leading cities of the West and also to take in the Pan-American exposition at Buffalo before returning home.

Acting upon the advice of the specialist whom he consulted in Montreal, Mr Richards entered the Royal Victoria Hospital for treatment, and the reports as to his condition received by friends here up to within a few days ago were quite favorable, therefore the sad news which came over the wires on Sunday occasioned much surprise and grief.

The deceased was a son of William Richards, head of the big lumbering concern of Boiestown, which bears his name, and was one of the best known and most popular residents of the Miramichi. He was a splendid specimen of physical manhood, and about the last person one would have thought death would have selected for a victim. He was about 45 years of age and leaves a sorrowing widow, who was at his bedside when the end came, and a large circle of relatives to mourn his untimely death.

The deceased was twice married, first to a Miss McLean, by whom he had one son, and his second wife was a Miss Gunter of Boiestown. He had no children by the latter. David Richards, merchant of Nashwaak Village, is a brother of the deceased, and Daniel Richards of this city, is an uncle. He also leaves three sisters, Mrs Howard McLean, of Nashwaak; Mrs Herbert Gunter and Mrs Dell Gunter, of Boiestown.

The remains will arrive at Boiestown by the I C R and Canada Eastern at eleven o'clock tomorrow morning, and the funeral will take place in the afternoon at three o'clock. It is likely that a number of persons from this city will attend.
