Serious Accident.

He was bicycling on St. John street, and while in the act of dismounting from his wheel, had the misfortune to fall and fracture his left leg just above the ankle. He was taken to his mother's

home where the broken bone was set by Dr. Bridges. Mr. Irving was to have returned to New York this week, but the accident will keep him here at least two months.

A SERIOUS CHARGE.

A Colored Man in Jail Charged With Indecent Assault.

A white girl named Maria Smith, employed as a domestic at Enoch Lunt's, at Lunt's Ferry, came to the city yesterday and lodged a complaint with Police Magistrate Marsh against one Joseph Patterson, (colored), also an employe of Mr. Lunt's, for an indecent assault alleged to have been committed on Tuesday last. A warrant for Patterson's arrest was issued by the police magistrate and placed in the hands of Police Sergeant Phillips to serve. In company with Constable Gerow, the sergeant drove up to Lunt's last evening and arrested Patterson. They brought the prisoner to the city and lodged him in jail, and this morning he was arraigned before Col. Marsh and pleaded not guilty to the charge. The examination is going on this afternoon at the police court with closed doors.

The prisoner Patterson is about thirty years of age and unmarried. During the past season he has been employed by Mr. Lunt to operate his ferry boat. As far as can be learned he has previously borne a good character. The Smith girl is less than twenty years of age.
