Seriously Ill.

Miss Edith Hilyard, who some years ago had a severe illness from typhoid fever, and almost by miracle escaped with her life, is again seriously ill, threatened, it is feared by her doctor, with another attack of typhoid.

President Trotter, of Acadia College, has received word from Mr DeWolfe, of Foxboro, Mass, that he will accept the position of principal of Acadia Seminary offered him by the governors of the college and will enter upon his work about the middle of July.

Alleged Murder Case.

The supposed murder case at Bailie, Charlotte county, is likely to be ventilated in the courts, as it is understood instructions have been sent to Detective Ring to place George McLaughlin, the suspected man, under arrest and convey him to St Andrews jail. He was expected to arrive at St Andrews with his prisoner today.

Four Months Jail.

The young man Hawkins, who pleaded guilty at the police court on Saturday to the charge of stealing a bicycle from W C Burt, was this morning sentenced by Col Marsh to four months imprisonment in the county jail. The prisoner was given some wholesome advice by the police magistrate and seemed to be very much affected. Col Marsh dealt leniently with the young man in response to a largely signed petition.

A Warning.

The danger from reckless bicycle riding which is largely indulged in, in this city, was illustrated at Halifax Saturday. A young man named Lassen, while riding at a rapid pace down Dresden Row, lost control of his wheel and was thrown violently against an iron fence, breaking his arm in three places. The indiscriminate, reckless riders, who traverse Queen street in this city every evening, dodging in and out at a rapid rate between swiftly driven teams, may learn a lesson from this Halifax accident.

Contract for Printing Awarded—Work Commenced on the New Building

STOLE A HORSE.

Daring Robbery at the
Victoria Mills Last
Night.

THIEVES ENTERED THE STABLE
OF JAMES RANKINE

And Made Off With His Horse
and Carriage.

This morning James Rankine, foreman of the Phoenix mill, made the discovery on going to the stable that his horse, carriage and harness were missing, having been stolen during the night. He notified Detective Roberts and telephone messages giving a description of the stolen rig were sent to points along the river.

Last night burglars made an attempt to break and enter the store at John G Murchie's mill, but were frightened away by Henry Grant the night watchman, without accomplishing their purpose. It was afterwards discovered that the culprits had bored several auger holes in the front door, with the intention of taking out one of the panels.

At noon today Mr Rankine received word that his property had been recovered by Charles McPherson about ten miles below Oromocto. The thieves abandoned the wagon and made their escape across the river in a boat and at last accounts had not been apprehended.

There is no doubt but what they are the same men who attempted to burglarize Murchie's store.
