N. B. Telephone Company.

The directors of the New Brunswick Telephone Company met Monday night at the Royal hotel. There were present J L Black and Chas Fawcett of Sackville, W. T. Whitehead, M. P. P. and F. P. Thompson, M. P. P. of Fredericton, and Dr. A. A. Stockton of St John. The meeting was called to consider the tenders received for the erection of the new telephone exchange on Chipman's hill. Only two tenders were received, those of Mooney & Sons and Tukey & Clark. It was found that the plans and specifications submitted by the Bell telephone people and the city by-laws differed in some respects, so that the directors were unable to act. The inspector of buildings will be interviewed at once, after which the directors hope to be able arrive at a decision as to the tenders.

Attempted Suicide.

Mrs Obed Sears, of Upper Abonshagan Road, about six miles from Sackville, attempted to commit suicide Monday morning, by taking Paris green. Obed Sears, her husband, died on Thursday, and since his death she has been somewhat despondent.

He was on the ocean when the first bidding for control of the voting power of the road began and had not reached this side of the Atlantic when the price of Northern Pacific shares went to \$1,000. Sir Charles' agents in this country decided to sell when the stock had gone clear of the roof, but found when they came to act that they had no power to do so. Had the stock been sold, Sir Charles would have received something like \$300,000.

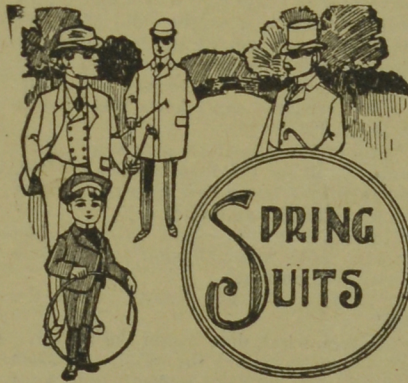
