Printing Bureau to be
Greatly Enlarged.

GOVERNMENT HAS NO INFOR-
MATION RE MONTGOMERY
TABLET AT QUEBEC.

The 24th to be a General Holi-
day in Any Case.

Ottawa, May 15.—At this morning's sitting of the House of Commons assent was given to the proposal of the printing committee to spend one hundred thousand dollars in enlarging the printing bureau.

The Premier in reply to a question, said the government had no information in reference to the proposal by Americans to erect a tablet in honor of the memory of Gen Montgomery if the city of Quebec choose to permit them to do so.

The premier also stated that if the house did not prorogue before May 24th, the governor general would be asked to give his assent to the bill making the 24th of May a holiday.

CANADIAN ACTRESS SUICIDES.

Woodstock, Ont. May 15.—Francis Raymond, an actress, who committed suicide by inhaling gas in her room, in New York city, a few nights ago, because she was deserted by her lover, was formerly a waitress in the Buckingham Hotel here. In 1896 she married a commercial traveller, but lived unhappily and soon separated. She then went on the stage and attained a large measure of success. Her right name was Frances Gamble and she was a Canadian.

GREAT MILITARY DISPLAY.

Montreal, May 15.—The greatest military reception ever given in Canada will greet the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York on their arrival here. All regiments in Quebec Ontario and Marines from warships are to take part.

INVASION FROM BOSTON.

Large Party to greet the Duke of York at St. John.

Boston, May 15.—A contingent of Boston Britishers will go to St. John, N.B., in September to present an address of welcome and congratulation to the Duke of Cornwall and York when he reaches Canadian territory on his tour of the world.

There is considerable stir in the British colony here as to who will be included in the deputation, which will be headed by Consul General J. E. Blunt, and by him presented to the Duke and Duchess. All the British societies are to be represented. Captain Thomas T. Stokes, Henry Squire and A. D. Cairns will be the committee of three which will represent the old British Charitable Society; Col. Alexander P. Graham, Major Charles Courtney and Adjutant J. F. Turner will do the honours for the British Naval and Military Veterans' Association, and the Victorian Club, the Scots Charitable Society, the Boston Canadian Club and the Scottish Clans, will be represented. One hundred men from the British Naval and Military Veterans' Association will act as a guard of honor, in full uniform, for the Consul-General. Fifty members of the British Charitable Society will accompany the party. The deputation will travel over the route of the Dominion Atlantic to Yarmouth, N.S., then through Nova Scotia to Digby; thence across the Bay of Fundy to St. John.

CANADIANS IN TRANSVAAL.

Make a Move Towards Erecting Tablets in Memory of Dead Comrades.

Ottawa, May 15.—A circular has been received in the city from Pretoria, South Africa, containing the notice of the calling of a meeting for the purpose of discussing the formation of a Canadian society, having as its primary object the erection of memorial tablets over the graves of the deceased Canadian soldiers, and for other matters of a social nature. Howard C. Symmes, of Aylmer, Que., who sends the

notice, says that the meeting was held and there were fourteen present. A memorial fund was started and £25 subscribed by those present. Mr. Symmes adds, "We also appointed corresponding, local and employment committees. I think it will be a good thing for all. Of course, it is expected that the movement will be taken up all over South Africa. The headquarters of the society will be at Johannesburg."
