Interesting Occurrences Paragraphed for Her- ald Readers.

FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

M. Avery, Sharbot Lake, is now spoken of as the Conservative candidate for Addington, Ont., for the Federal house.

The statement that a through wire to Dawson City would be in operation Aug 1, was erroneous. Mr Gobeil, Deputy Minister of Public Works, says that the telegraph from Dawson will not be completed until the end of the present month.

The Dominion government has reconsidered its decision to send Radcliffe, the hangman, to Dawson. The duty of finding a person to execute O'Brien devolves upon the sheriff of the territory, and if he cannot find someone it will be his task to perform the job himself. It is felt there will be hardly any difficulty in securing a man in the Yukon country.

The New Brunswick Coal and Railway Company is calling for tenders for the construction of the first section of 15 miles of railway from Chipman through the Newcastle coal fields. Tenders are to include everything for the complete construction of the section of road except rails and fishplates and the work to be done by December 1st. August 15th is the date on which the tenders will close.

People may often wonder how Lady So-and-So is described in the London papers as having on the previous evening worn a magnificent tiara worth many thousands of pounds, on another evening a beaddress quite different in character but equally rich; another time something else. It appears there are many jewelers in the West End who carry on privately a regular trade hiring out to approved customers tiaras, necklaces, bracelets and other articles for special occasions. And a very fine paying business it is.

The report that the Allan line has decided to withdraw its winter passenger service from Portland is officially corroborated. The contract which the steamship company made last spring with the Dominion government for the trans-Atlantic mail service, stipulates, of course, that the sailings in winter shall be from a Canadian port—St. John or Halifax. The contract does not expire until the spring of 1903, so that Canadian ports instead of the American port, will be the Atlantic terminus of the Allan's weekly service during the next two winter seasons.

Mr. Thomas Moffatt, of Cape Town, South Africa, writing to his brother-in-law, in London, Ont., says: "We have had with us for the last two weeks Mr. James Cumming, the special commissioner from Canada, who has been in Natal for some time. We have interviewed a great many of the leading men here with a view to getting their ideas and information on various subjects, and I am therefore in a position to state that Mr. Cumming's report will favor making arrangements for a direct line of steamers from Canada, as also establishing one or more large commission houses in Montreal for the purpose of purchasing goods and acting as bankers for South African importers. This seems to me the only course open if the exports from Canada are to be largely increased.

A present for the Duchess of York in commemoration of her visit to Montreal, is suggested in some quarters. Thursday, at the meeting of the civic committee, a dainty bed, coverlet made of lace, white satin and yellow silk, was exhibited by Mlle A Brosseau, 712 St Denis street. It is proposed that this piece of work should be bought by the city for \$500 and presented to Her Royal Highness. The committee was pleased with the article, but action was deferred until the chairman of the citizens' committee was consulted. The coverlet, which is very elaborate, is composed of 240 different lace rounettes, every one different from the other. Fourteen months were consumed in the making of these rounettes. The drawings on the various panels are done in black stencil. The designs upon the smaller panels are copied from pictures by Watteau. The scheme of the cover is

a large medallion, forming the centre, four panels at the head, the foot, and at the sides, and of four medallions on the corners.
