

BOER ATROCITIES.

Have Created A Feeling
of Horror Throughout
England.

CALL FOR STRONG MEASURES
TO PREVENT FURTHER
MURDERS.

Daily Mail Scores a Victory over
the War Office.

Kroonstad, Orange River Colony, Aug. 5.—Two Boers came into the British lines yesterday under a flag of truce with a letter from Former President Steyn.

New York, Aug. 5.—According to the London correspondent of the Tribune the cold-blooded Boer atrocities reported by Lord Kitchener have caused a feeling of horror throughout the country. The newspapers call for strong measures. Men who do deliberate murder lose their belligerent rights. Hope is expressed that if any such are captured, they will be made to pay the full penalty for their crimes. The weakness of the British position lies in the reluctance of the military authorities to punish with severity proved offences against the laws of war. Considerable dissatisfaction has for some time past been felt here, owing to the leniency that Kitchener has displayed in his operations against the Boer guerillas, but with this latest phase of the campaign he may alter his policy, as it will be necessary for him to show the loyal natives that he is able to protect them.

London, Aug. 5.—In the house of commons Saturday Lord Stanley, the financial secretary of the war office, replying to a question, said the cost of the war in South Africa from April 1 to July 31 was \$178,750,000, partly chargeable against the deficit of last year. The actual cost in July was \$6,250,000 weekly. The chancellor of the exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, said if the war continued at the same cost for the next three months it would necessitate spending the whole of the reserve he had provided for financing the third quarter, but he had reason to hope that this would not be necessary.

London, Aug. 5.—The contest between the war office and Daily Mail has terminated in a victory for the paper. The war office had not only cut off the Daily Mail's South African casualty lists and other official news, but had also ordered the various news agencies not to supply the Daily Mail with any official information distributed from the war office. Thereupon the Daily Mail sued the news agencies under its contracts to compel them to deliver the news. The war office then held back bulletins until near the hour for the morning papers to go to press. This raised a storm of protest from the provincial papers and the war office finally capitulated and called off the boycott.

London, Aug. 3.—In the House of Commons yesterday, Mr. Balfour, in reply to a question by John Dillon, said the government did not propose to ask for a grant of money to General Butler on account of his service in South Africa.

Bermuda, Aug. 3.—The transport Manila has arrived with an additional number of Boers to be detained here as prisoners of war. Martial law has been proclaimed on Tucker's and Morgan's island.

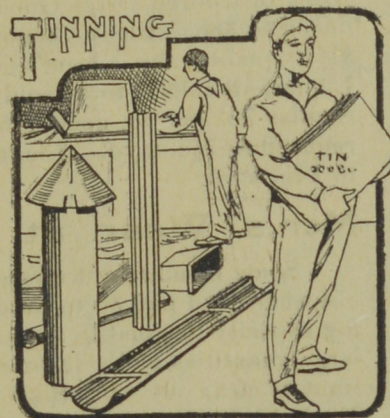
