thing.

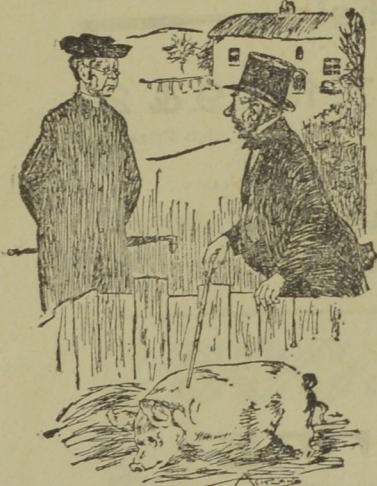
"Well," answered the old bachelor,

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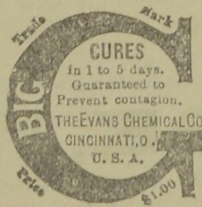

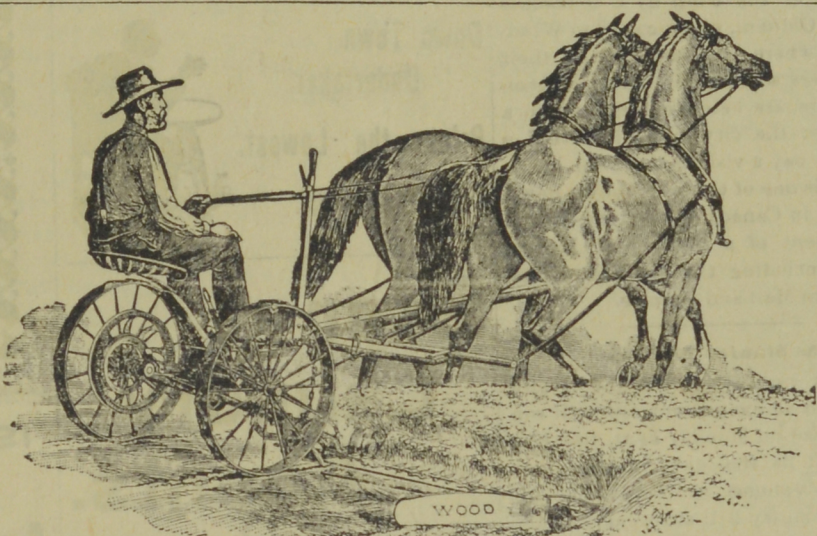

BYE-LAW.

A Law in amendment
of a law to impose a
tax on the owners or
harbors of dogs in
the City of Fredericton.

Be It Enacted by the Mayor, Aldermen, and
Commonalty of the City of Fredericton, as
follows:—

1. Every person who is within the City of
Fredericton the owner, possessor or harbor-
er, of a dog or bitch, shall pay a yearly li-
cense for each such dog or bitch, as follows:—

For each male dog.... \$1.00
For each female dog or bitch..... \$3.00

2. Every person who is in the City of Fre-
dericton, aforesaid, the owner, possessor or
harborer of a dog or bitch, shall before the
first day of August in each year, procure and
cause such dog to be numbered and describ-
ed for the year ensuing, in the office of the
City Treasurer, and shall cause such dog or
bitch to wear around his or her neck, a col-
lar of metal, or of leather with metal plate
on which metal or plate collars shall be in-
scribed the name of such person, and to
which collar shall be secured or attached a
metal check upon which shall be encribed
the letters F. T. P. (Fredericton Tax Paid)
and figures indicating the year for which
such tax has been paid, and a number cor-
responding with the number under which
said dog or bitch is for the time being regis-
tered in the books of the City Treasurer.

3. Every person shall on payment of the
tax imposed by section one of this law, and
registering his dog as provided in section
two, be furnished free of charge with the
check mentioned in the next preceding sec-
tion.

4. Any police constable, city marshal, or
other person authorized for the purpose by
the Mayor, City Council, or Police Magis-
trate, may seize any dog or bitch found run-
ning at large or elsewhere than on premises
of the owner, possessor, or harborer thereof,
contrary to the provisions of this law, and it
shall be the duty of such police constable,
city marshal, or other person so to do; and
every such police constable, city marshal, or
other person shall forthwith after making
such seizure, deliver such dog or bitch to the
Pound Keeper of the city; and it shall be the
duty of the Pound Keeper to whom the same
shall be delivered to impound such dog or
bitch in a suitable box or stall, to be by him
provided for that purpose, and supply it
with food and water while so impounded;
and in case it shall not be reclaimed there-
after provided within six days after it shall
have been delivered to the Pound Keeper, it
shall be the duty of the Pound Keeper to
kill such dog or bitch.

5. The owner, possessor or harborer of any
dog or bitch impounded under the foregoing
section may reclaim his or her dog or bitch on
application to the Pound Keeper and proof
of ownership, and on payment to the Pound
Keeper of the sum of twenty-five cents for
each and every day the said dog or bitch has
been impounded, and the further sum of
three dollars, one dollar of which shall be re-
tained by the Pound Keeper, one dollar paid
to the person or persons by whom such dog
or bitch shall have been impounded, and one
dollar to the City Treasurer to form part of
the city revenue.

6. Any person or persons so keeping
or harboring or allowing to be kept or
harbored, any dog or bitch within the
City of Fredericton, neglecting or refusing to
comply with the provisions of the first section
of this bye-law, shall be liable to a penalty of
three dollars for each and every dog or bitch
so kept; and in case any person or persons
shall neglect or refuse to take out a License
for any such dog or bitch within four days
next after any conviction, under this bye-
law, said person or persons shall be liable to
a further penalty of four dollars for each and
every subsequent offence.

7. All licenses issued under the provisions
of this bye-law shall expire on the first day
of August next following the date of the issue
thereof.

8. Dogs and bitches under the age of six
months are excepted from the provisions of
this law.

9. This law shall come into full operation,
force, and effect, on the first day of August in
the year of our Lord one thousand eight hun-
dred and ninety-five.

10. The bye-law passed on the fifth day of
August, A. D. 1886, entitled, "A Law to Im-
pose a tax on the owners or harborers of
dogs, and otherwise restrain the keeping of
dogs in the City of Fredericton," and any and
all bye-laws passed in amendment thereof
and in addition thereto are hereby repealed.

Passed and enacted this twentieth day of
June, A. D. 1895.
