

AGAIN IN MOURNING.

The Dowager Empress of Germany is Dead.

DECEASED WAS ELDEST SISTER OF KING EDWARD,

And Mother of the German Emperor.

BOER GENERAL KILLED AFTER AN EXCITING CHASE.

And Important Papers Captured.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Cronberg, Aug. 5.—At 1.30 a.m. it was said there was no change in the condition of Empress, she was fully conscious and all her children since Henry who is at Cadiz were assembled in the sick room. Official bulletin issued early this morning said weakness hourly increasing, strength of heart still slight.

Cronberg, August 5.—The Dowager Empress Frederick of Germany died at 6.15 p. m.

[Victoria Adelaide Mary Louise, eldest daughter of the late Queen Victoria and the Prince Consort was born, November 21 1840, and was the royal couple's first child. She married January 25 1858 the Crown Prince Frederick of Prussia afterwards Emperor of Germany (March to June 1888) who died June 15, 1888 and has as issue four sons, the eldest of whom is Emperor William of Germany, and four daughters. She had been suffering for some years from cancer, and was unable to be at her mother's deathbed.]

Cronberg, Aug. 3.—Emperor William's resolve to hasten here is due to the fact that Dowager Empress Frederick had a serious failure of strength yesterday evening. The condition of the Dowager Empress, however, has since improved and there is no disposition to anticipate immediate danger.

Homburg, Aug. 4.—The Empress, Crown Prince Frederick William, Prince Eitel-Frederick and Prince August William arrived at Cronberg, where the Dowager Empress Frederick is lying dangerously ill, at a late hour tonight. Other royal personages who have arrived are Prince Adolf of Schaumburg-Lippe, Prince and Princess Friedrich Carl of Hesse, and the Crown Prince and Princess of Greece. Emperor William has not yet arrived at Cronberg. He is expected there at 3 a.m., tomorrow. Prof. Renvers, the specialist, wired his majesty to come with all haste.

The following bulletin concerning the illustrious patient was issued during the afternoon:

"The external disease from which her majesty is suffering and which has been slowly increasing, has in the course of the last few weeks extended to the internal organs.

"Her majesty's strength is diminishing rapidly owing to inability to take sufficient nourishment. She is conscious and at present without pain.

It is not known whether Queen Alexandra will accompany him. The Duke of Cambridge is already in Cronberg.

ASSIGNMENT AND PREFERENCES.

Judge Wilson Gives Judgment in Case of Shediak Boot and Shoe Co. vs. Lottimer.

Judge Wilson handed down a decision upon a new feature in assignment and preferences act, at chambers this morning, in the case of the Shediak Boot and Shoe Company against Andrew Lottimer.

In April last Mr. Lottimer made an assignment for the general benefit of his creditors to Mr. John Kilburn. Previous to this the Shediak Company had recovered a judgment in the York County Court against Mr. Lottimer, and after the assignment had filed their claim with the assignee and attended the meeting of the creditors of the estate. On the tenth of July, the company applied for and obtained from Judge Wilson, an order for the examination of the defendant, without reference to the assignee. Upon the return of this order Mr. J. W. McCready appeared for Mr. Lottimer and asked to have the order for examination rescinded, on the grounds that the affidavit upon which it was granted had not been served upon the defendant, and that the application must be made through the assignee at the request or demand of the creditor, as provided for by the assignment act. After taking time to consider, his honor this morning decided that the order for examination must be rescinded, and dismissed the application of the plaintiff.

This afternoon the visitors are being entertained to a drive about the city, and this evening they will pay a visit to the local lodge. Mr. Cook is one of the best known newspaper men in Canada, being the Ottawa correspondent of a number of leading journals, including the London Times, and Toronto Mail and Empire.
