WELCOME THE MINTOS.

The Governor General of Canada and the Countess of Minto, will receive a hearty welcome to this city tomorrow. It will be their first visit to the capital of New Brunswick, and if the weather is favorable they will see Fredericton under favorable conditions. The only regret is that their visit will be far too short, but perhaps they will call again.

The programme for the reception and entertainment of the distinguished visitors is as comprehensive as possible under the circumstances, and reflects credit on His Worship the Mayor and council, the energetic gentlemen of the citizens' committee, and the local government.

A welcome at the depot from the civic authorities and the populace, a drive around the city, a luncheon at the Queen Hotel, the presentation of the civic address at the Parliament buildings and a levee in the assembly chamber, constitute sufficient to occupy. Their Excellencies' attention during their brief stay among us.

Lord Minto is more of a soldier than a statesman. He carries wounds received in battle; he has served his Queen and country in Egypt, in Afghanistan, in South Africa and in Canada, in the stern realities of war. He will, therefore, be welcomed to Fredericton as a soldier of great distinction, as well as Governor General of Canada, and representative of His Majesty. He is accompanied by his accomplished lady, the Countess of Minto, who since coming to Canada has evinced a strong interest in humanitarian and charitable projects, and His Excellency's reception will be none the less hearty on that account.

Let us accord Their Excellencies a cordial and enthusiastic welcome to Fredericton. The hearty cheers of the populace who are not included in the official arrangements will at least be as satisfactory to them as the formal plans for their reception. Give the distinguished visitors plenty of good old fashioned British cheers as they alight from the train and make their progress through the streets. Hang out a flag or some other decoration in honor of the visit, and show Their Excellencies that no where in Canada, in the Empire, is there a more loyal, hospitable people than those of Fredericton.

BADEN-POWELL TO LAURIER.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier is in receipt of the following appreciative letter from General Baden-Powell, dated Zurfontein, Transvaal:

"Will you forgive my writing you a short note to tender my gratitude for all that you have done in assisting the development of the force with whose organization I am charged? By your good offices the Canadian contingent has been added to our establishment, and with the excellent material of which it is formed it will be a valuable addition to our strength. I have learned in the recent campaign to admire and to appreciate the worth of the Canadians in the field and am, there-

fore, truly glad to welcome your contingent to our corps. Comprising, as it does, men from every one of our great colonies, as well as from the home country, the South African constabulary is par excellence an imperial corps, and as such I hope it will typify the empire itself as working honestly and harmoniously in the great work of bringing peace and prosperity over the territories now added to our rule. And in this good work the Canadians will have a prominent share. I trust the connection thus commenced between Canada and South Africa is but an augury of a close and profitable connection in the future. I am sir,

A VIOLENT STORM.

P. E. Island Experienced the Worst Seen in Many Years.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., July 29.—Union Road, five miles from the city, was visited Saturday by an electrical storm beginning with a rainfall turning to hail. Residents state that hail stones could be gathered by cart loads. Some of the hail stones measured over four inches in circumference and resembled clear ice fragments. The damage to crops is serious. The track of the storm was about a quarter of a mile in width. Crops on four farms were totally destroyed. Cucumbers in which hail stones had embodied themselves half an inch were brought to the city. Berry bushes, rhubarb and wheat were battered to pieces, apples were knocked off trees and the turnip crop was ruined. Men were compelled to throw coats over their heads to protect their faces. Live stock in the field at the time suffered considerably, and in some cases animals were badly lacerated.

FEAST OF ST ANNE.

Moncton, July 29.—The feast of St Anne was celebrated at Buctouche, yesterday, and upwards of four thousand people, including a large number from Albert and Westmorland were present.

An impressive service was held. Father Pacificque from Restigouche preached the sermon in the Micmac language and in the afternoon in French. Ten priests were in attendance and the church was over crowded. Over two hundred went from Moncton.

GOLD FROM THE KLONDIKE.
