Interesting Occurrences Paragraphed for Her- ald Readers

FROM LATE DESPATCHES AND EXCHANGES.

The manufacturers of Toronto will spend \$10,000 on an arch in honor of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York.

It is officially announced that 8,084 Boers have been killed, wounded or captured, or have surrendered since the 1st of March last.

A Missouri editor respectfully calls the czar's attention to Ex-Senator W. H. Ryan, of Crawford county, Kan., at whose home the twelfth son has just arrived.

Lord and Lady Minto, with their children and staff, embarked Wednesday at Quebec on the government steamer Minto for their trip to the Maritime Provinces.

The Dominion authorities have decided to accede to the request of the Northwest Territories Government and permit a contingent of twenty or thirty of the Northwest Mounted Police, with horses, to go to the Pan-American in connection with the Territories exhibit there.

Mrs Mary Delay, a widow of Gardner, Mass., was the victim of a burning accident at her home Sunday night, death ensuing Monday. While she was standing on a table to wind a clock the table collapsed and upset a lamp. Mrs. Delay's body and arms were terribly burned, and she died after several hours of intense suffering. Seven children survive.

Official preparation for the King's coronation procession are already being made. The expected route is through the same thoroughfares as at Queen Victoria's coronation in June, 1838. Offers running up to several hundred pounds are already being made for seats on the route. It is evident that King Edward's coronation will eclipse in magnificence that of any previous Sovereign.

Staff-Sergeant T. Rogers, who for twenty-five years has been orderly at Government House, Ottawa, celebrated his silver wedding on Monday, and the Governor-General, Lord Minto, gave him a magnificent cabinet of cutlery. Rogers has occupied the position of orderly for twenty-five years, and has served under Lords Dufferin, Lorne, Lansdowne, Stanley, Aberdeen and Minto.

The Department of Fisheries has decided to commence oyster culture operations in Annapolis Basin and Minas Basin, N.S. In both localities Mr. Kemp, the department's oyster expert, found traces of former oyster beds, which had apparently become extinct, and it is proposed to lay down a large quantity of breeding oysters for the purpose of restoring the beds in these waters.

The Berrien county Circuit court, Michigan, has set aside a mortgage of \$800 on the farm of Joseph Covency of Cushman. Covency gave \$600 in cash and a mortgage to one Patello, an attorney in Alaska, who defended Covency when he was imprisoned on a charge of extorting \$7,000 from Frank Phiscador, a miner, against whom Covency made certain charges. Covency says he was placed in jail, and Patello dictated terms before moving to obtain his freedom.

Canton, China, advises give details of the loss of 300 lives by landslide and flood, occurring at Lungkeng in June. The landslide was caused by a tremendous earthquake. Native accounts state that a great flood of water poured out of the mountains, carrying everything before it. Two hundred houses were swept away and the fields swept bare of crops. Several great landslides occurred, carrying a large portion of Lungkeng into the bay. What appeared like a tidal wave followed, making it impossible for any who were carried into the water to escape.

FISH AND GAME

Some Reminiscences and Recommendations

FROM A GAME WARDEN WHO HAS LONG EXPERIENCE.

Present Provincial Management Commended.

(Special Correspondence to the Herald.)

Harvey, July 10.—Edward James, game warden, Tweedside, Manner Sutton, when asked his opinion regarding the present game and fish laws said he thought that the enforcement of these laws will ultimately be a great benefit to the game of this country; he says as far as his part of the work is concerned, that he takes a deep interest in the welfare of the animal product of the forest and the finny tribe of the stream and lake. It is three years and over since Mr. James received his present appointment and his ground lies in an average radius of 30 miles from his home which he searches thoroughly in quest of game and fish poachers at regular periods, save when he is justified in believing that parties are shooting or trapping in violation of the law. He states that many of the people of this country are inclined to laugh at the New Brunswick game and fish laws, but if they will just stop for a moment and ponder and listen to the stories of our old settlers in regard to the changes of the last 30 years or more they will at once change their minds and praise the present provincial and dominion administrations for the able manner in which they have come to the assistance of the preservation of our game and fish.

Mr. James, who is now past fifty-seven years of age, says that when he was a young lad, that is previous to the Saxby gale, the game and fish of all kinds frequented this country in abundance, something perhaps beyond the comprehension of the young folks who live among us at the present day, and that through the Indian and white man's waste while on the hunt, the different species became nearly extinct in some places. Why, he says that the deer, caribou, moose and other fur bearing animals, were killed simply for their pelts, the carcasses being allowed to lay and decay. He relates that thirty years ago, the trout in Oromocto and other adjoining lakes, were to be had at any season. Fishing parties, who came from St. John and other cities, were in the habit of annually making a tour to the Oromocto lakes, where they were then sure of good luck with the rod, and some bow or other, a rivalry struck up between the strangers and settlers, and some unknown parties took to netting the fish, which soon spoiled the angler's sport. It was some time after these facts became known, that any stringent measures were adopted by our government to put a stop to these evil practices.

The powers that be, awoke to the fact that something had to be done to preserve the game and fish of our fair province, and after some discussion and reasoning over the subject they gave it their careful consideration and passed in the Legislature what is termed "An act to prevent the destruction of the fish and game of the forests," which has been amended from season to season, until we now have it to say that New Brunswick is sought after by Americans and others as a famed hunting and fishing resort, all through the timely assistance of the Government and their game wardens.

Mr. James in giving some timely advice to the authorities, says that the game commissioners should make extra exertions to look after the game, from about the middle of May until the weather turns cool, and the flies leave; he says that at this time of the year the deer, caribou and moose, etc. make for the lakes and ponds, where they can have access to the water to get rid of the heat and flies, a good portion of their summer's food is around the lakes, such as lilies, deer rushes etc., and a person wishing to kill one of these animals, can easily attain their desires if the game warden is not right on the spot, to prevent them. He says that frequently he has found a fawn deer dead in these locations, being so simply for the reason of the mother having been slain by some wanton person, who evidently has none

other occupation than breaking the laws of our country. Also he has frequently found several old deer which were shot for sport. He says that for the game wardens duty only requiring them to make their rounds in the winter season does not suffice for all that is required of them, and that if the government were to increase the wardens' pay and make their season for watching game of a longer period that they would not repent of it, and as we learn that in our neighboring republic the State of Maine, there are paid officers appointed to prevent parties from setting forest fires, and destroying wood lands, that should our respected rulers combine an office like this with the game business, they would work well together and give the wardens some ambition to do their work with greater vigor. The estimate of amount of money spent by tourists in Oromocto Lake's district last year is counted to reach the sum of eleven hundred dollars or more. At the present time there are three handsome sporting houses in the vicinity of this lake, and eleven pleasure boats are launched. The trout caught are mostly of fair size, sometimes running as high in weight as 5 lbs.; of course the writer of this article does not pretend to say that all are of this weight, but 3, 4, and 5 lbs are common.
