THE LIBERAL CONVENTION.

Friends of the Liberal party and other electors of York who are not in sympathy with the candidature of Mr. McLeod at the present time, are requested not to forget the Liberal convention to be held at the Y. M. C. A. hall, York St., Fredericton, at 2.30 p. m. Tuesday next, July 16, to nominate a candidate for the House of Commons.

There should be a large and representative gathering. The party is entirely free from factional troubles, and it should commence the campaign by a rousing and enthusiastic convention. Do not forget the date of the convention Tuesday, July 16, at 2.30 p. m., Y. M. C. A. hall, York St., Fredericton.

THE PARTY SPLIT.

The serious disagreement and split of the Conservative party over the candidature of Mr. McLeod is ample evidence that he is forcing himself into the contest, and is repudiated by that large and important section of the party which has hitherto borne the brunt of the Conservative fights in this constituency. When gentlemen like J. S. Neill, E. Byron Winslow, John Palmer, John Kilburn, J. W. McCready and scores of other sturdy Conservatives whom we could name, were putting up winning fights for their party in this constituency Mr. McLeod had not developed as a Conservative politician, but was basking in the government employ as prohibition commissioner, from which sinecure he scooped in a cool ten thousand dollars. With this elegant bag of government coin in his breeches pocket, Mr. McLeod suddenly bloomed into a politician, and now seeks to dictate terms to the party to which he owed great obligations. The gentlemen we have mentioned along with many others of the Conservative party naturally resent being dragged into a party contest when there is absolutely no prospect of success, and when they are sought to be led by a gentleman who mistakes a personal following of a few narrow minded persons for the Conservative party of York.

Mr. McLeod is not a representative Conservative; his nomination was made and accepted at a convention which, according to the local Conservative organ, was composed of only thirty-four delegates out of one hundred and ninety-four who were qualified to sit and vote in the convention. The Conservative party simply ignored Mr. McLeod's call for a convention, and they will ignore him throughout the contest and at the polls. Mr. McLeod is deceiving himself in thinking that he is the Conservative candidate, and he attempts to deceive the electors of York when in his newspaper, the Religious Intelligencer, he declares that the convention which nominated him "was large and thoroughly representative."

Mr. McLeod goes into the contest as the candidate of a faction, with the express disapproval of the Conservative leaders, both here and elsewhere, and the fate he will meet at the polls will convince him that he had much better be attending to his sacred duties, than to fomenting political discord and animosity.

Hon. G. H. V. Belyea, a native of Queen's county and a graduate of the University of New Brunswick is now minister of agriculture in the North West territorial government. This week Mr. Belyea has been at Ottawa and succeeded in persuading the federal authorities to have a number of the Mounted Police four-horse teams sent to the Northwest exhibit at Buffalo, accompanied by a detachment of Mounted Police.

The Sun will please observe the union and fraternity that exists in the Conservative party of York over the candidature of Mr. McLeod. One of the Conservative organs boldly charges another with selling out to the Grits, and declares that a power which is called an Octopus paralyzed a former president of the Conservative association, and has Conservative lawyers etc. dangling at the end of its tentacles. For information as to the beautiful spirit of brotherhood in the Conservative wigwam, we refer our esteemed friend the Sun to this week's issue of the Reporter, the special organ of Mr. McLeod.

Y. AND C. RAILWAY.

Dr. Moore has a Large Number of Men at Work on the Road.

Stanley, July 10.—Dr. Moore, the promoter of the York and Carleton branch railroad, is moving right along with his work. He has at present 60 men employed ballasting and only lacks one mile of completion; we expect this will be accomplished in a short time. The signal boards, turn table, whistling posts and various other sundries will come next, after the ballasting. Dr. Moore intends to have the station and engine house tastefully painted, which will put on a very business like appearance to the road. The Doctor is very fortunate in securing the services of Engineer George Von Goebel and Conductor Hannigan, and as both of these men are very efficient officers, the travelling public will be well served when they patronize the York and Carleton railway. It will be announced later on, at what date the road will be open for passengers. The railway has been handling freight for some time past and has met with continued success.

"I Have No Time for Making Money."

It may not be generally known that wireless telegraphy was made possible through the researches of Dr. Branly, a modest savant of Paris, little known outside scientific circles. Marconi himself gratefully acknowledged his indebtedness to Dr. Branly by sending him the first message that traveled the Channel from the English shore. What Branly did was to show that the resistance of a circuit, which included an arrangement of iron filings, changed under the influence of the electric vibrations called Hertzian waves. Marconi caught up the hint, and by a series of admirable developments produced great practical results. Speaking with the learned Doctor recently, I asked him if the vast commercial advantages of the discovery had struck him. He replied simply: "No. I was not thinking of that side of the matter at all. I was conducting experiments, which I am still continuing, in the hope of finding out something clearer about electricity itself." And he showed me a series of his latest investigations, which present problems insoluble according to the usual conception of electricity. It was like hunting the secrets of nature in the densest thickets and jungles, as Alexander Bain said of Davy. And that simple manner of disregarding the fortune that might have accrued to the discoverer seemed as fine as the saying of Agassiz when asked to deliver a series of remunerative lectures: "I have no time for making money."

Correct Accent by Phonograph.

It has long been supposed that France, or a Frenchman, is necessary for the acquisition of a proper French accent. This is no longer so now that an economical substitute for the Frenchman has been found in the phonograph. It is understood that a corps of French professors are spending their whole time in conversing into phonographs. A professor's day's work is to fill thirty phonographic cylinders. These cylinders are destined to go forth bearing precious French accents into thousands of happy English homes. A book has now been prepared, called "The Pictorial French Course." It contains thirty lessons, each illustrated by a picture ingeniously portraying the objects alluded to in the lesson. Each lesson corresponds word for word with one of the phonographic discourses. All that the student has to do therefore is to set his phonograph going. The book will tell him what it is saying. It will be seen that the new system is pictorial-oral.—London Daily Mail.

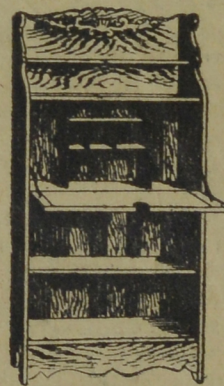
