

PRESSMEN'S OUTING

Arrangements for Maritime Province Trip Completed.

THE PARTY WILL VISIT PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND, HALIFAX,

Sydney, St. John, the Annapolis Valley, Fredericton and Other Points.

(Toronto Globe.)

Mr. John A. Cooper, Secretary of the Canadian Press Association, returned to the city yesterday from a ten days' tour in Prince Edward Island and the Maritime Provinces, where he has been completing the arrangements for the annual excursion of the association. In conversation with a Globe reporter Mr. Cooper stated that he had visited all the points in the Maritime Provinces and Prince Edward Island along the route of the trip, and had received assurances that the people will gladly welcome the visitors. Everywhere the desire is expressed that the people of Ontario should see for themselves the development that is going on in the eastern portion of the Dominion. Mr. Cooper, while in Montreal made final arrangements with the Intercolonial railway officials for a special train, which will leave Montreal on Thursday, Aug. 15. Among the places to be visited are Moncton, N. B., Summerside and Charlottetown, P.E.I., Sydney, C. B., Halifax, N. S., the Annapolis Valley, St. John, N. B., Fredericton, A. B., and Quebec City. Probably the most picturesque portions of the trip will be the ten hours' sail through the celebrated Bras d'Or Lakes and the trip on the Dominion Atlantic railway through the Annapolis Valley, famed for its apples. A drive of 22 miles will be taken from Kentville to Blomidon Mountain, from which may be obtained what is reputed to be the finest view in the Maritime Provinces. This drive will end at Wolfville, and will traverse the valley made historic by Longfellow as the home of Evangeline.

Opportunity will be given the visiting pressmen to see the great industrial development which has taken place at Sydney, special arrangements having been made to visit the Dominion Steel Company's works and the various coal mines. Ample time will also be given to see the sights at Halifax, the headquarters of the North Atlantic squadron of the British navy. Two days will be spent on Prince Edward Island, of which its people speak as the garden of the Dominion. One Sunday will be spent in Charlottetown and the other in Halifax.

The sail from St. John to Fredericton up the St. John River, which has been called the Rhine of America, many people asserting that for variety of scenery it even excels the Rhine, will be very pleasant. The reversible falls on the St. John River are also of interest. On the way back the Metadedia Valley, famous as a fish and game region, will be traversed in day time, and a day will be spent in the historic city of Quebec.

The party will travel in a special train of sleeping cars, with dining and baggage cars attached, and for the greater part of the journey, which will be some 3,000 miles in length, will enjoy the invigorating effect of the sea breezes. Arrangements have been made with the C.P.R. and G.T.R. to collect the party from various points in Ontario, and land them in Montreal in time to start on August 15. Arrangements have also been made for the C.P.R., by which those who desire to return to Ontario before August 30, when the main party will arrive, may do so by the short line from St. John.
