## OUR SATURDAY SERMON.

### Rev. Chas. A. Eaton of Toronto, deals with the Christian's Hope.

Every thoughtful man must be troubled by the mockery of life. Considered from any human standpoint, our lives are incomplete, transitory and illusory. Injustice seems more successful than justice. Strength triumphs, although coupled with wickedness, where goodness fails, and nothing turns out to be what it seems. One starts to get money. He is successful, but behold the money has not brought him what he hoped. Another strives for place and fame, and when he gains the prize it turns to ashes in his hands. We build, and our structures crumble away even while we are at work upon it. It would seem that man is the victim of vast non-intelligent power ascriptions in his expression as the pranks of a whirlwind. If spirit lies back of human life, looked at from the human side, it would seem to be a malign spirit. No home is safe from the dread destroyer. No love is strong enough to do for its object as it would like. No work abides, and the grave is waiting for all. It is small wonder that some find it easier to believe in the devil than to believe in God.

Against this appalling universal mockery mankind has made its noblest struggle. Instinctively, under every clime, in every age, among all peoples, men have conceived the idea of immortality as an explanation of life's mystery. Unless there is another world than this, this world cannot be explained. This is the most unanimous proposition in the history of human thought. And what a sublime structure has been reared as a refuge from life's mockery. Sublime, but mournful and inadequate, for amidst its ruins the fool brood of despair and failure crouch out their doleful lament creaked in the shadows of the night. Among the lower types this hope of immortality expresses itself in base superstitions about ghosts and evil spirits. The Egyptians gathered their whole thought around a really splendid philosophy of immortality. The soul after its wandering of three thousand years was expected to return to the body, which in preparation for the reunion was carefully embalmed. The Indian philosophers rest upon this assumption of another world, and make the highest good to consist of reabsorption into the unconscious source of all. Plato, with his emanation theory, and Aristotle, with his doctrine of the pure reason, expressed for the Greeks their highest thought; but these were mere glimmerings through universal gloom. Upon an ancient Roman tomb appears this epitaph: "I was not, I was. I am not. I don't care." What an epitome of a world's life!

Approached from the side of reason, we have had a metaphysical argument for immortality based upon the simplicity of the soul. Unlike the body, the soul cannot be separated, therefore it must exist forever. The argument from design and analogy has great weight, as has also the common testimony of human nature to a desire for everlasting existence. But these are mere evasions at the riddle of existence. And even the poet in his intimations of immortality leave the whole cast rest upon an assumption. Herein is the glory of the Christian hope. Jesus Christ has brought life and immortality to light through the Gospel. In Him men have a hope sure and steadfast, which is as an anchor entering into that within the veil. The Old Testament contains some noble passages, which set forth that at death the body returns to the dust as it was, and the spirit returns to God who gave it. In Job, in the Psalms, in Daniel, occur rapturous visions of immortal life. But compared with these, the Christian hope is as the sun to the star light.

The Christian hope of immortality rests upon a twofold basis—historical and experimental. It is a historical fact that once into mockery and mystery of life God came, incarnate, Jesus Christ, God and man incarnate, lived, was crucified, was buried and rose again. Paul expresses the dread alternative, and stakes everything upon the truthfulness of this historical fact. "If Christ did not rise, your faith is vain; ye are yet in your sins." There is no resurrection, no immortality; and if in this life only we have hope, we are of all men most miserable. The Christian hope is based more broadly upon an inner experience, which comes to each man who will take Jesus as Saviour and Master, "Christ in you the hope of glory." "The love of God is shed abroad in your hearts by the Holy Spirit." "That I may know Him and the power of his endless life," is the object which the apostle holds to be the highest good. We, through the spirit of faith, wait for the hope of resurrection. "In hope we were saved," and now abide in the world, faith, hope, love.

Surely, a sublime philosophy of life and its facts. What a solution of life's mysteries and mockery! Henceforth death has no terrors. The grave is changed from a valley of troubling to a door of hope. Nothing can happen to the Christian. He has God living in him. And as long as God lives he must live. "Oh grave where is thy victory? Oh death, where is thy sting? Thanks be unto God, who giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ," who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the Gospel. This is the Christian hope.

THE RAILWAY QUESTION.

Sir William VanHorne Opposed to Government Control.

Montreal, Feb. 22.—Sir William VanHorne, Chairman of the C. P. R., was asked today if he held the views in favor of the nationalization of the railways and the administration of them by a board for the benefit of the Canadian people which had been attributed to him by Mr. W. F. Maclean in the House of Commons recently. Mr. Maclean was reported to have said in the House that a prominent railway man the other day had expressed such an opinion to him, and upon being pressed he declared that it was Sir William VanHorne. Sir William's reply was in these words:—"I have never expressed an opinion in favor of Government control of railways. My opinion was asked on the subject the other day, and I replied that unless the management of the railways could be kept out of politics Governmental control would certainly be disastrous. And in reply to a further question I said that a national board of directors, entirely beyond political control or influence, might succeed in handling the railways of the country; but I could not see how such a board could be established and maintained on a sufficiently independent footing. I regard it as impossible."
