### MARRIED IN 39 SECONDS.

#### Quick Transition to the State of Matrimony.

IT WAS IN CHICAGO WHERE THIS RECORD-BREAKING CEREMONY TOOK PLACE.

Groom Catches a Train Bound East and Bride Catches Another Going South.

Chicago, April 13.—Justice M. R. M. Wallace made a record two nights ago of marrying a couple in 39 seconds. They were in a hurry to catch a train, or, rather, two trains. The groom went to Michigan and the bride to Missouri.

As the bridal couple stood before the venerable magistrate in the parlor of his Michigan abode it was plainly visible that they were from the country. The groom was as calm as if he were waiting his turn in a barber shop. His placidity is accounted for by the fact that he was once a justice of the peace himself down in Missouri, and the marrying business was not new to him.

The bride was slightly nervous. She had come all the way from St. Charles, Mo., and was tired from the long journey. Whether it was a sigh, or a deep, long breath that escaped from her lips as she stood up to have the marriage knot tied, these presents could not say. Although the room was cool she used her handkerchief continually to remove the perspiration from her forehead. There was a look of determination in her face that seemed to say:

"Well, I've gone this far and I'm going to go through with it."

The clinched her teeth as the white-haired justice began the wedding ceremony.

The groom was Harry A. Tanner of Soo Junction, Mich. He is a telegraph operator for the Duluth, South Shore & Atlantic railroad. He also takes care of the switches, sells local tickets and makes out freight waybills. His position is no sinecure.

Up six weeks ago Mr. Tanner lived at Briscoe, Mo. This town is 10 miles from St. Charles as the crow flies. According to his buff-colored business cards he was quite prominent in that vicinity. He was notary public and justice of the peace, and in the left-hand upper corner of the card the announcement was made that deeds were carefully written.

Miss Ella Baker, the bride, is 23 years old. She would be taken for a country school-teacher. Her hair is black, and she wears it in a fashion becoming to pretty country maidens.

When Mr. Tanner left Missouri to go to Soo Junction he told his sweetheart that they would get married at the first opportunity. Arrangements were made by letter for the meeting, which took place in Chicago.

It was late when the marriage license was secured, and after supper the happy couple started out to find a magistrate. Lieut. Roban of the central station directed them to Judge Wallace.

After the knot was tied the groom asked, "How much do I owe you?"

Justice Wallace did not hear the question, or at least he made no reply.

The groom repeated the query and the "judge" smilingly replied:

"O, I'll leave that to you. You've been a justice and you ought to know the fee."

Mr. Tanner counted out \$2.50 and asked if that was satisfactory. It was.

The couple went away the groom shook Justice Wallace by the hand and said:

"Goodby, I hope to see you again."

"There's nothing in that for me," said the gray haired magistrate after the couple had gone. "Mrs. Wallace gets all her marriage fees up to \$250. I get anything over that."

### BITTER BLAST.

#### Christian Science Given Hot Denunciation.

REV. DR. J. M. BUCKLEY CALLS IT WORSE THAN ATHEISTIC.

New York, April 11.—The consideration of "Christian Science" caused an exciting half hour at the New York East conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, held today in the Hanspaul church, Brooklyn.

Dr. J. M. Buckley, editor of the Christian Advocate, bitterly assailed the cult of which Mrs. Eddy is the head, and declared that the minister who deserted his faith and followed it was started on the way to perdition.

The matter was brought up with a resolution expressing regret and good wishes for the Rev. S. E. Simmons, who leaves the church, a convert to Christian Science, Dr. Buckley, in opposing such a measure, said:

"To recommend this brother in joining a hostile body to us is contrary to public policy. In fact, to pass any resolution in reference to one who has thus acted in joining a body that is worse than atheism in its principles is to send him before the public with credentials that would be of large value to his new propaganda."

"Before Mr. Simmons became infected with the bacilli he was a simple-minded, serious, genial and most noble-souled brother, but since he has been coquetting with this particular superstition I cannot say the same for him; he is sadly changed."

"This belief is not to be opposed because it is absurd alone; not because it is absolutely untrue science, but because it is contrary to nature's every do-tribe—even that of morality, the personality of God, the deity of Jesus Christ and every other belief that this church stands for. I declare to you it is the most subtle form of heresy the church has had to encounter since the third century."

"It declares for freedom and personal responsibility in sin, and here is a man who repudiates our system and takes up with such a belief."

"Such a man who would stay with us believing this is absurd, and if he pass from us, he is preparing for perdition."

"If we regret his action we give him a mighty impetus in his new doctrine, and his power of opposition to us in the city. This is not the time for a stiff backed church, neither is it the time for a jellyfish church."

Dr. Buckley concluded by saying that the incident of 12 years ago, when a prominent minister was made a convert by Ingersoll, was not to be compared in its gravity or more deeply deprecated than the action of Pastor Simmons today.

The resolution of sympathy was lost.
