PREPARING FOR REPUDIATION.

Local opposition papers are paving the way for Mr Hazen to recede from the Moncton convention programme of running local elections on Dominion party lines. The thing did not work to the satisfaction of the Conservatives. When the great guns of the party journeyed to Moncton and commanded every man of their party, every man belonging to them who had supported the local government, to go into opposition, they counted upon a consolidation that would sweep the government from power, but the independent spirit of the electors thus attacked rebelled against any such type of bossism. The Conservative friends of the government absolutely refused to be dragged into any such arrangement by which it was hoped to hand over the seals of office to Dr Stockton and Mr. Hazen. They did not believe in conducting local elections on federal party lines. They had observed New Brunswick enjoying progressive government under the coalition system, which had been in force ever since Mr Blair assumed power in 1883 and they could see no good and sufficient reason for deserting their old friends. The elections came on a few months later, and the Moncton convention idea lamentably failed. Dr. Stockton and his combination were hopelessly beaten, only a remnant of the party securing election to the assembly, and the government found itself retained in power by a larger majority than ever, and with the support of several prominent Conservative members.

Mr. Hazen is now the director in chief of the opposition forces, and if we are to judge by the utterances of his organs, he is endeavoring to undo the work of the Moncton convention. Mr. Hazen is willing to adopt any course that would secure office for himself and his friends, and one of his newspapers, with an innocence that is truly refreshing, admits that Mr. Hazen is following a policy of expediency.

AN ILLUSION.

The St. John Gazette editor, who enjoys luxurious apartments in his cool and palatial office on Canterbury street, thinks the man with the hoe with his shirt collar unbuttoned, his boots off, and himself reclining beneath the friendly shade of an apple tree while his wife serves him with frozen strawberries and iced lemonade, is to be envied these extremely hot days. But in the meantime who is hoeing the potatoes and killing the bugs. What does the Gazette editor know about farming anyway, except perhaps political farming, in which some of the hottest things to be touched are the politicians during a general election. Let him take up the agricultural calling during the heated season, and he will soon wish himself enveloped in the cooling St. John fogs. The man with the hoe has no snap these hot days, neither will the man with the rake when haying opens, enjoy immunity from hard, wearing labor.

Rev. Dr. Bennett who is dead at his home in St. John, nearly half a century ago was an energetic and successful Presbyterian clergyman in that city, and was much admired for his culture and ability in the pulpit. Among the members of his family surviving is the wife of Mr J E B McCready, editor of the Charlotte-town Guardian.

Prof. Heliprin, the eminent Arctic explorer, is quoted as saying that he has confidence that Lieutenant Peary will be heard from within two months, and that

with intelligence from him will come the announcement that he has discovered the Pole. If this prognostication turns out correct our own Capt Bernier will be disappointed. People who know the Capt. declare that he will hang the Canadian flag on the north pole if he has to shin up it himself to do the act.

The thirty fourth anniversary of the birth of the Dominion of Canada will be celebrated on Monday, when every loyal man in the country should enter freely into the rejoicings that recall the founding of a nation which has made the most remarkable progress. The Fathers of Confederation builded wisely and well, and what was in 1867 a few scattered provinces, is now a prosperous, progressive and happy Dominion, with a destiny that no man can measure.

Editor Luguin in the Victoria Colonist comments the fact that the Old Men's Home in that city is located next to a cemetery without any intervening fence. The condition is certainly a grave reminder of the inmates' destiny.

The summer so far is remarkable for heat and severe electrical storms. Friday the hot wave struck even St John, and at various places in Canada, and the Eastern States was a record breaker.
