

DOMINION DAY.

How it will be Observed
by Citizens of Fredericton.

SPORT AT THE PARK, YACHT RACE, AND BASE BALL MATCH.

at Scully's Grove in the
Evening.

Although the citizens have planned no organized celebration for Dominion day the holiday will be fittingly observed in this city. A large number of visitors are expected and there will be lots of opportunity for enjoyment. The steamer Victoria went to St John at four o'clock this afternoon, and will arrive after dinner with the Foresters' excursion and if the weather is fine there will no doubt be a large crowd.

At two o'clock the first of a series of yacht races arranged by local yachtsmen will take place. The start will be made from the B and B club house and the following yachts will compete: The Athore, owned by W B Ganong; Summer Girl, A A Shute; Rambler, W C Burt; Lark, Bert Atherton; Doreen, Enoch Vandine; Vera, J P McManus; Wapuk, J P McPeake; Bygueto, Bayard Simmons.

An event which is being looked forward to with great interest by horsemen is the stake race to be pulled off in the driving park at 2.30 in the afternoon. The horses to compete in the event are Harry L, owned by W A Lindsay, Bert Lint's Slago, Harvey McCoy's mare, and Grocer Boy, owned by H C Jewett. The race will be half mile beats best 3 in 5. A small admission fee to the park will be charged.

The attraction for the evening will be the festival in Scully's Grove, under the auspices of the firemen and Knights of Pythias. The 71st band will be in attendance and there will be the usual games and attractions. A number of valuable prizes will be given away.

A DASH FOR LIBERTY.

Prisoner Crossin Escapes From the
Police but is Recaptured.

William Crossin, the young man under arrest on the charge of stealing a bicycle from James Green at Parsons Hotel, made a daring but unsuccessful attempt to escape from the custody of the police this forenoon. This was the day he was to have been sentenced, and he was taken from the jail to the police court for that purpose. A second charge of theft having been lodged against him, since he pleaded guilty to the theft of a bicycle, Col Marsh decided to remand him until Tuesday next, that an opportunity might be afforded to investigate the other complaint.

The prisoner was taken back to the granite institution on Brunswick street by Policeman O'Neill, who being aware of the slippery nature of the fellow, took the precaution to handcuff him. Upon arriving at the door of the prisoner's cell, which is on the ground floor of the building, the officer removed the bracelets and turned his back for a moment to unlock the door of the cell. He had no sooner done this than Crossin, who had been waiting for his opportunity, took to his heels and was out of the back door like a flash. Mrs Hawthorn, who had just arrived upon the scene, took in the situation at a glance and going to the door called to Frank McManiman, another prisoner who was working in the garden, to apprehend the fugitive. Crossin managed to scale the fence, and dashed across lots to Charlotte street, with McManiman, officer O'Neill and others in hot pursuit. McManiman proved himself to be the best sprinter, and succeeded in overhauling the fugitive in Havlock Coy's yard. He held him hard and fast until officer O'Neill came along with an express wagon and took him back to durance vile.

Crossin, it will be remembered, made his escape from the St John police last week in exactly the same way and was not recaptured until the next afternoon.

DEATH OF SIR THOS. GALT.

Deceased was Father of Capt Galt,
Formerly of the Salvation Army
Fredericton.

Toronto, June 29.—Sir Thos Galt
Chief Justice of the court of com-
mon pleas died this morning. He had

been in a feeble state some weeks and his death was not unexpected.

[Deceased was a brother of Sir Alex Galt, in early Confederation days one of the prominent statesmen of Canada. Miss Galt, an officer in the Salvation Army, stationed in Fredericton some years ago, and Mrs Dr Oliver of Halifax, are daughters of the deceased.]

REPORTED WRECK

Of a C P R Train Near Megantic.

(Bangor News.)

Vanceboro, Me., June 28.—A report is in circulation here to the effect that a terrible wreck occurred on the Canadian Pacific railway 25 miles west of Megantic Thursday about midnight. No details of the trouble can be ascertained here, but it is said that the Montreal express, known as train No 9, from Montreal to Halifax was wrecked and many people were killed. The C. P. R. has cancelled all of its trains both east and west and is maintaining strict secrecy regarding what has happened on the western end of this division. The report which was received here was to the effect that there was a washout eight miles long and that the train ran off the end of a bridge and down into the ditch many feet below.

[A similar report was in circulation here this morning, but could not be verified. A report published elsewhere says only the locomotive was ditched and nobody hurt.]

Four Sleepers Jumped the
Track on Penn. Rail-
way.

PASSENGERS INJURED BUT
NONE KILLED.

Switch had Been Turned by
Some Miscreant.

Pittsburg, Pa., June 29.—The Atlantic express on the Pennsylvania railroad, was ditched two miles west of Greensburg, Pa., early this morning.

Three passengers were hurt, but their injuries are not serious, and the other passengers escaped with a shaking up and the injured were able to continue on their way.

It is thought that the accident was a deliberate attempt at train wrecking and a searching investigation will be made. A switch had been turned, and the lock broken, but the engine, express combination and baggage cars got over safely. The last truck of the first sleeper jumped the track and the four sleepers following were thrown over the embankment. The passengers were transferred to another train and brought to this city.
