THE ROYAL VISIT.

Great Preparations in Progress at Various Points.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Ottawa, Aug 2.—It is not unlikely that when the official programme of the Royal tour in Canada has been finally revised it will be cabled to Cape Town for the consideration and sanction of their Royal Highnesses. The short stay of the Duke and Duchess in Canada, which will be scarcely over a month, promises to be so crowded with events as to leave comparatively little opportunity for rest for them; and yet, despite the limited period of their visit and the fact that they will be kept fulfilling engagements from the time of their arrival until the moment of departure, each mail to Ottawa brings scores of fresh invitations. It will be a physical impossibility for the Royal visitors to comply with a tithe of the legion of requests for their appearance at public functions from all parts of the country; and, in order to avoid disappointment, this fact should be recognized.

The Department of Public Works has been giving considerable attention to the matter of decorations and improvements at Quebec, Ottawa, and other cities to be visited, but is not yet in a position to announce details. Fenings Taylor has been over to Buffalo studying the decorations and illuminations, especially those of an electrical character, to be witnessed at the Exposition and he will embody in a report to

the Department some of the features which he thinks might be reproduced with advantage in Canada. Considerable inventive genius needs to be employed to transform the surroundings which will meet the Royal gaze on landing at Queen's wharf, Quebec.

It is quite possible that, in view of the large expense which will be entailed by the Militia reviews planned in the Royal honour, the Government may reduce the number of men to be paraded. The idea was to have a force of 7,000 at Toronto, but it would not be surprising if the number was cut down to 5,000.

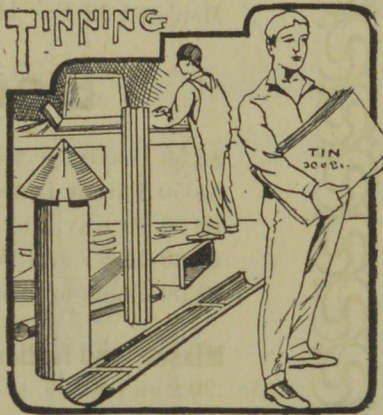
