TORPEDO BOAT SUNK.

Portsmouth, G. B., Aug. 2.—Torpedo boat No. 81 has been sunk near the island of Alderney. It is reported that three lives have been lost, but no particulars have been received.

YUKON REVENUE.

Ottawa, August 2.—According to the official returns, the royalty on the gold output of the Yukon for the month of June was over \$100,000. For the same month of last year the royalty amounted to \$200,000. The royalty is now 5 per cent, whereas last year it was 10 per cent.

BATTLESHIP ASHORE.

Hong Kong, Aug. 2.—It is reported that the new British battleship Glory, flagship of the British China Squadron, is ashore somewhere between here and Shanghai. The warships Eclipse, Daphne and Pigmy have left this port suddenly. No explanation is given of their departure.

KING WILL VISIT CORK.

London, Aug. 2.—It is believed that the King and Queen will visit Ireland next April, and probably open the International Exhibition which is being organized in Cork. The King has already paid six or seven visits to Ireland. He first went there with his parents in 1849, and his last visit was in 1885.

WILL PASS THROUGH CANADA.

Montreal, Aug. 2.—Telegraphic advices have been received at C. P. R. headquarters that upwards of thirty officers, who were engaged in the recent war with China are passengers by the steamer Empress of Japan, which is due at Vancouver in August. Amongst these officers are General Gascoigne, who was formerly commandant of the forces in Canada, and General Reid—both members of General Gaselee's staff.

VETERAN PRINTER'S DEATH.

London, Ont., August 2.—London's veteran printer, Mr. James Brierley, died yesterday at his home in West London, in his 87th year. Mr. Brierley came to London between forty and fifty years ago and had his training as a printer in Dublin. During a very long period Mr. Brierley was connected with The London Free Press printing establishment of this city—here also for a considerable time in the capacity of proof-reader, though also working a good many years ago "at the case." He leaves a widow,

two daughters, and a son, [Mr. James Brierley, managing director of the Montreal Herald.

KILLED IN FAIR FIGHT.

Toronto, Aug. 2.—Civil Surgeon A. C. Macdonald, who enlisted in "O" Battery, Royal Canadian Field Artillery, in December, 1900, and took part in the operations of that corps in South Africa, returned to the city today. With his brother, Dr. W. J. Macdonald, now house surgeon at the General Hospital, he performed efficient medical service in the campaign. The doctor said it was the general opinion of the corps that "Gatling Gun" Howard fell in a fair fight, and was not, as has been reported, the victim of a treacherous assassination. HEALTHY FINANCES.

Montreal, Aug. 2.—Mr. W. Harold Covert, of Halifax, a member of the firm of Pearson, Covert & Pearson, of that city who was here yesterday, remarked in an interview at the Windsor Hotel that the finances of Nova Scotia have been placed in an exceptionally strong position owing to the tremendously increased development of the coal trade of the Province. In a short time, Mr. Covert says the yearly output at Glace Bay will be 3,000,000 tons, which gives \$375,000 as the annual amount paid into the coffers of the Nova Scotia Government by the big concern alone.

AMERICAN TRANSPORT DISABLED.

San Francisco, Aug. 2.—The transport Lennox from Manila for this port, has been disabled two hundred miles down the coast.

Seven men from the disabled ship who were picked up in a small boat arrived here today and told the story. With a broken shaft, dearth of provisions and drifting helplessly, the ship is in the current that sets down the coast. The seven men composed a volunteer crew who started out to secure assistance. The tug Slocum has been sent to find the vessel.

OFFERS BIG PURSE.

Boston, Aug. 2.—A special from Newport, R. I., to the Herald says:

If a tale circulated among yachmen here is true, Thomas W. Lawson promised his crew \$100,000 if the Independence defeated the Constitution and the Columbia. The Constitution being out of the races, it is declared that the offer holds for the defeat of the Columbia alone in the present series. This extraordinary amount of race money will give each member of the crew about \$2,000.

NO SETTLEMENT YET.
