THE WOUNDED PRESIDENT.

The outcome of President McKinley's wounds is still in doubt. The critical period is yet to come, but there is an expression of medical opinion that he may recover. Words of sympathy have been sent the distinguished sufferer from all parts of the world, but none are more sincere than those penned by Sir Wilfrid Laurier on behalf of the Canadian people. Whatever differences there may be between this country and the United States, all sound of strife is hushed in the presence of the great crime perpetrated against the ruler of the great Republic. In Canadian churches Sunday prayers for the President's recovery were as general and as hearty as in his own country. The people of Canada remember that in ancestry, language and laws they occupy common ground with their neighbors to the south, and these conditions heighten the bond of humanity. The bulletins announcing the President's conditions are as eagerly scanned in Fredericton as in Washington, in St. John as in New York.

The fiend who sought the president's life is alleged to have made a confession, in which he claims for himself sole credit for the awful deed, but the indications are that he was acting under instructions from the Anarchist society to which he belongs. At any rate he was driven to the frenzy which prompted the commission of the crime by the teachings of Anarchy. His soul was fired by the appeals for the blood of rulers which he heard at Anarchist gatherings, from Anarchist leaders, and the society is as much responsible for the crime, as if it had formally directed the shooting.

The attempted assassination has aroused the American nation to a sense of the conditions surrounding it. So long as the shooting of European rulers was the business of the Anarchists they were permitted to openly proclaim their pernicious doctrines. They were allowed to hold meetings at which murder was counselled, and their press has not been suppressed, but now the thing has struck home, and the probability is that the Anarchist cattle will be hunted out of the country, and their vile conspiracies suppressed.

THE SUN'S DILEMMA.

The Sun tries to wriggle out of its attack on the local government regarding the appointment of a French school inspector by laying the blame on the Moniteur Acadian. The facts however remain. The appointment of Mr. Doucet was announced in the Herald and Telegraph Thursday, and on Friday, the Sun published an article from the Moniteur charging Premier Tweedie with not having made the appointment, thereby breaking his promise to the Acadians. This is a species of journalism that might be popular among Indians, but is scarcely decent in a civilized community. Either the Sun was ignorant of the appointment having been announced, or its attack was maliciously made. The Sun can choose whichever horn of the dilemma test suited to its taste.

WHO WILL BE HONORED.

An Ottawa despatch says: "It is reported on fairly good authority that not more than half a dozen Canadian mayors are to be created C. M. G.'s by the Duke of Cornwall. Two or three provincial premiers and lieutenant governors may be knighted. The names of Hon. M. S. Mulock and Mills are freely mentioned

as likely recipients of the honor of K. C. M. G."

There have been several reports to the effect that Governor Jones of Nova Scotia is to be knighted, and if that honor falls on him it is probable that Governor McClellan will not be overlooked. His Honor has a longer public record than any Canadian Governor except Sir Oliver Mowatt of Ontario, and then among the premiers it is possible that Hon. L. J. Tweedie may be remembered. We are rather short on Knights in New Brunswick at present, and perhaps the Duke will remember this when he is distributing royal favors in Canada.

The attempted assassination of President McKinley has aroused a feeling of grave anxiety in the breasts of Canadians for the safety of the Duke of York who is to land next week on Canadian soil. Extra precautions will be taken to sacredly guard the person of the Duke, not that it is feared anybody in this country would have designs on His Royal Highness, but because of the possibility that some Anarchist crank from the United States might take it into his head to make an attempt on the life of the royal visitor.

Some of the gentlemen who helped to run the York municipal as part of the Conservative machine will not be in the council to be elected next month. Mr. Graham of Prince William and Mr. Seymour of Douglas are among those who will not seek reelection.

Mr. McLeod seems to be lost somewhere in the back settlements of the county.
